

Hollinger Greenshirts Swamp The Dome

Jack Young Gets Three Hits on McIntyre Flagship as Alex Brownlee Scores Shut-Out Win

Jackie Ladds and Bill Lahti Also Score Direct Hits to Send the McIntyre Flagship to the Bottom. Brownlee Stood Out Like a Black-eye as he Took Year's First Shut-Out.

Recognized as one of the top-ranking goaltenders in Canada, Alex Brownlee, former Dome custodian and now with the Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons, scored the first shut-out of the current N.O.H.A. season at the McIntyre Arena on Monday night as his team swept to a convincing 6-0 win over "Admiral" Nelson's McIntyre Miners. The only other shut-out scored here this year was in the Lions Cup pre-season tournament when the Dome Porkies eliminated the Atlantic City Sea Gulls by a score of 11-0.

In spite of the heavy torpedo attack launched by the Ankerite crew the game stood out as a real thriller and there wasn't a man on the ice working harder for the shut-out than Brownlee himself. He made dozens of miraculous saves in the last few minutes as the Macs threw on extra power in an attempt to save the white-wash. Jackie Young, Jackie Ladds and Manny McIntyre were other players that stood out well throughout the entire contest. Young scored three goals, Ladds scored two and McIntyre was the hardest working back-checker seen here for a long time.

Jackie Ladds was given a penalty in the first period and just as he returned the Ankerite crew scored their first direct hit when Bill Lahti dented the twine at the 8:50 mark. It was the only hit scored in the first encounter but "Admiral" Nelson's flagship limped off the ice licking its first wounds.

In the second period the attack became more ferocious than ever and the terrific power of the Ankerite gun-boat was too much for the Admiral's fleet. In one of the many full-time attacks Jackie Young slipped a heavy bomb amidships to send his outfit two ahead. Ossie Carnegie was chased for tripping Holouka and at the height of the McIntyre invasion of the Ankerite citadel Jackie Ladds broke away and got in the clear to cripple the McIntyre battleship with another torpedo. Manny McIntyre got credit for an assist on the play.

Jackie Young, complete master of the fight at this stage, broke away alone again in the third period as he took the disc away from Johnson at the blue line and pulled Porter away out to slip the rubber in. On this play, Young made Johnson look foolish as he slipped the puck from him and went in with nobody to beat. Eleven minutes later Jackie Ladds scored his second direct hit on the McIntyre flagship when he picked up a wild McIntyre pass and screeched in alone to drive the disc past Porter. It was a crippling blow to the McIntyre battle fleet but it was left to Jack Young to finally sink the crippled ship. There was only three minutes left when Young drifted in for the kill. Everybody had taken a shot a Porter before Jack finally got his stick on the rubber and when he took a shot he didn't hit any of the posts but aimed for the centre and almost drove the puck through the twine.

For the remaining three minutes the McIntyre club fought fiercely but they were fighting a losing battle as Brownlee decided that he was finally going to get his shut-out. He had come dangerously close to getting one on two or three previous occasions but this time it was his day. His efforts in the

Annual Bonspiel of Ontario Curling Association

To Be Held at Toronto, Feb. 16th to Feb. 21st.

Toronto, Jan. 7—Plans have been completed and preparations are well under way for the 15th annual bonspiel of the Ontario Curling Association, which will be held on the 25 sheets of artificial ice of the four Toronto curling clubs from Monday, Feb. 16 to Saturday, Feb. 21. The programme is similar to those of recent years, there being six trophy competitions with every rink guaranteed a minimum of four games and prizes being awarded to the winners, runners-up and defeated semi-finalists in each of the six events.

During the past two years the Bonspiel Committee has made substantial contributions to the Red Cross from the annual income and this will be continued again this year but, in addition, a further contribution will be made towards the war effort as all individual prizes, a total of \$6, will be in the form of War Savings Certificates. Members of trophy-winning rinks will also be given suitable souvenirs of their victories. There will also be grand aggregate jewels for the members of the rink with the highest percentage of wins.

The annual banquet and entertainment will be held on the evening of

Tuesday, Feb. 17, in the Royal York Hotel, and the other features of the 'spiel' will be continued. The committee has revised the rules of the competitions in order to eliminate several features which have caused inconvenience to the competitors. The events are: Royal York, open to all rinks; Barks-Ellis-Pryce and Seiberling, open to all rinks winning their first games in the primary; the North American Life and Seagram, for rinks that lose their opening game; and the O'Keefe, for rinks which fail to win more than one game in any of the other competitions.

The previous maximum of 124 rinks will prevail and already a number of entries have been received although the announcements and invitations were not mailed until New Year's eve. Entries close on Monday, Feb. 9 and the draws will be made on Wednesday so that skips may be notified of the time and place of their first games by Friday. All information regarding further particulars and entry forms may be secured from the secretary, W. J. Stewart, 84 Wellington Street West, Toronto. Entries are confined to clubs that are members of the Ontario Curling Association and other recognized curling associations.

Tough luck was the cause of last night's loss and coupled with that was the loss of two of their best defencemen, Al Taylor and Neil Pirie.
