

Here is a sample of the "walking out dress" shortly to be issued to all Canadian soldiers to wear "off parade". To soldiers in the Army of a democracy off parade hours are essentially social occasions when the camp or barracks is forgotten and the amenities of civil life, voluntarily given up for the duration, again become important.

Tea with a young Canadian's "best girl" calls for his "best suit" and this is what is posed above. The uniform, made of sturdy khaki serge, is quite like that worn by commissioned officers - just as commissioned officers in training wear the same uniform as their men. Composed of belted jacket worn with collar and brown tie, and slacks with which low shoes and black socks are worn, the "walking out dress" will be issued to all Canadians in the ranks within the next few weeks.
