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Funeral Tuesday of Late Robt. Wilson

Here Since 1914. Took Active Interest in Hockey and Baseball.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday at 4 o'clock in the afternoon for the late Mr. Robert Wilson, who died at St. Mary's Hospital on Saturday evening at twelve minutes to nine, after an illness of two months. The late Mr. Wilson, well-known throughout the district during his long residence here, had been an employee of the Hollinger mine since he first took up residence in Timmins in 1914, and only left his work when he became ill two months ago. Services were conducted by the Rev. Canon R. S. Cushing of St. Matthew's Anglican Church, and interment was made in the Timmins cemetery.

The late Mr. Wilson was born in Kingston seventy years ago. He made his home in Timmins at 21 Laurier avenue, and leaves to mourn his loss his wife and one son, Adger. One sister Mrs. G. T. Gowen, survives in Toronto. During the years he resided in Timmins, the late Mr. Wilson was known as an active member of the Oddfellows Lodge, and had many friends in that organization. He was also very widely known for his active connection with baseball and hockey. For years he was a valuable official and practically all hockey events here and he also gave assistance and interest to baseball. A man of active interests and genial and friendly, Bob Wilson will be much missed by many friends in Timmins and district.

High Tribute Paid to Mrs. A. MacLeod Algoma Pioneer

Mother of Miss Nina MacLeod and Mrs. E. L. Urquhart Passes Away.

The recent holiday season was saddened for Miss Nina MacLeod and Mrs. E. L. Urquhart, of Timmins by the illness and death of their mother, Mrs. Annie MacLeod, of Leeburn, near Saulx Ste. Marie, Ont. Last Friday issue of The Saulx Star, Marie Star had the following reference to the death and tribute to the late Mrs. MacLeod:—
"Leeburn, Jan. 5.—(Received Jan. 8.)—A quiet sadness pervaded the Christmas festivities of this community, owing to the illness and death of one of its earliest pioneers, Mrs. Annie MacLeod, who passed to her long rest on the morning of Wednesday, Dec. 24th, after having been confined to her bed for four weeks. During that time she celebrated her seventy-eighth birthday. She was the youngest and last surviving member of a family of ten children, born to Mr. and Mrs. Roderick MacLeod in Sutherlandshire, Scotland.

"At the age of five she emigrated to Canada with her parents, who settled first on a farm near Kincardine, Ont. Some years later, the pioneering spirit led two of her brothers to the wilds of Algoma, where they located on the two adjoining MacLeod farms at Leeburn. Here in 1880 they were joined by Mrs. MacLeod and her parents. A third time the journey north from Rydal Bank had to be made by a foot path through the woods, and the Thessalon river was crossed by means of a raft. The first MacLeod home was on the farm now occupied by Neil MacLeod.

"D. J. MacLeod then purchased the adjoining MacLeod farm and here the couple spent their married life, having celebrated their golden wedding some months before Mr. MacLeod predeceased his wife three years ago.

"Mrs. MacLeod leaves to mourn her loss, three children, Nina and Rhoda (Mrs. E. L. Urquhart) both of Timmins, and Clifford, at home. The eldest son, Seymour, died during infancy. There are also five grandchildren, Lois Urquhart, in Timmins, and Sheila, Donald, Isobel and Elvin MacLeod, at home.

"Funeral services were held on Friday, Dec. 28th, at the family residence. Rev. O. Dyke, of Bruce Mines, conducted the service, and by a strange coincidence chose the same text, as that used by Mr. Rickard at the funeral of Mr. MacLeod:—"I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Henceforth, there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me and that day; and not to me only, but unto all them that love His appearing." Hymns sung were a favourite Psalm, "I have waited for the Lord, My God," and the favourite hymn of the deceased, "Jesus Saviour, Pilot Me."

"Pallbearers were Wray and Howard Stewart, Hazen Dolson, Griffin Hopkins, Ernest MacKay, and Neil MacLeod. Interment at Aberdeen cemetery.

"Mrs. MacLeod's death was due to arterio sclerosis, and during the past eight or nine years, as the disease progressed, she did not always enjoy good health. Previous to that time she was very active.

"She was a member of the Leeburn church, and was one of the organizers of the first Women's Association. During the first great war she was active in Red Cross work. She was known throughout the country for her readiness to extend a helping hand wherever there was sickness or poverty or trouble of any kind. Those who knew her at that time marvelled at her untiring strength and unflinching cheerfulness.

"She stretched out her hand to the poor, yes, she reached forth her hands to the needy, she looked well to the ways of her household, and catcheth not the bread of idleness. Her children arise up and call her blessed."
