

# McIntyre Miners Edge Dome Last Night

## Maki and Nevins Score Three Each on Friday Night as the Dome Scores Second Straight

### Winning Streak is Stretched to Two Games With Win Over Hollinger Friday Night. Dome's First String Forwards are Outstanding in Win. Score Seven of Eight Goals.

Olle Proulx's Dome Porkies stretched their winning streak to two games on Friday night as they downed the second-place Hollinger Greenshirts in a dazzling exhibition of Canada's national sport at the McIntyre Arena. Two days before the Porkies had sent the McIntyre Miners reeling from a devastating attack and they repeated their performance over the Hollinger crew. Fifteen goals in all were scored during the sixty minutes later Bill Maki firing the winner with blond hair and a half minute left to play.

Outstanding men on the ice were the front line of the Dome, Maki, Nevins, and Woon. This trio of veterans showed plenty of class and impressed the fair-sized crowd that saw the game. They proved without any doubt that they are by far the best forward line in the league and they counted seven of their team's goals. Nevins and Maki collected three each while Norm Woon got one and O'Mara got one. Their brilliant passing plays kept the crowd interested all evening.

The Greenshirts went into an early lead when Wink Wilson rapped in a fast pass that started from Wickens and went through Williams before Wink batted it in. The time was sixteen seconds. Five minutes later Bill Maki scored an early goal and then, again, scored the Greenshirts' second goal when he accepted a pass from Wickens and blasted it past Kemp.

About halfway through the period Les Nevins scored the first Dome counter when he took a perfect pass from Allard and slammed it into the net. Hollinger again went into a three-goal lead a couple of minutes later when Fuzz Hafidson shot in Stewart's pass.

With four minutes of the period left the Dome put on the pressure and the final result was that they emerged at the end of the period with the score tied. Bill Maki scored the first one on a pass from Danny Linton and then O'Mara shot in a pass from Bruce and Zeniuk to tie the score.

Dome took over the lead in the second period and from then on the Hollinger either trailed them or were on even terms. Dome went into a three-goal lead early in the period before the disorganized Hollinger team could stop them. It was the brilliant passing plays by the Dome front line that were gradually pressing them forward. Bill Maki scored an unassisted goal at the seven minute mark and seven seconds later the same man fired a pass ahead to Woon who drilled it past Bentley. Three minutes later Nevins scored when he broke away with Allard and took a pass near the blue line to coast in on Bentley and score.

In the last six minutes of the period the Greenshirts got two of the goals back when Baker rifled a pass from Stewart past Kemp and then Wink Wilson took Petrucelli's pass and made sure of the goal as he shot and coasted in for any rebound in the event that Kemp stopped the shot.

Les Nevins sent the Dome two ahead in the third period when he scored on Maki's pass near the halfway mark. But the Greenshirts cut the lead down again on a goal by Tic Williams. Williams coasted in alone and had everything his own way as he pulled Kemp and slipped the rubber behind him. Three minutes later Joe Delmonte tied the score when he took passes from Tic Williams and Wink Wilson and then drilled his shot high into the corner.

Bill Maki broke into the clear with a couple of minutes left near the end and pulled Bentley away out when he faked a shot. He held the puck back for a long time and when the goal was clear he slid the rubber in behind the astounded Bentley.
