When the officers arrived they found the office looking as if a cyclone had struck it, while Emerson and Whelehan acted as if dazed. The two union officials were given prompt medical attention but did not appear to be seriously hurt. Police say that the union officials suggested that they knew the men who had caused the near wreckage. The police could not learn the names of these alleged disturbers, and Emerson left Sudbury without preferring any charges.

In the meantime, however, Hon. Mr Conant received a letter from Peter Dunlop, secretary of the Hamilton Labour Council, in which it was said: "Justice demands impartial treatment of all parties, and we urge you now to show that the establishment of law and order does not only mean the use of law to attempt to smash the organizations of the working people of Canada." Hon. Mr. Conant has taken up this challenge and says that the whole matter will be investigated. 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
