

Bisons Forced Overtime In Last Game

Last Period Spurt Gives Hamilton Majors Second of North-South Play-off Games

Front Line of Runions, Brady and Conick Score Three Goals in Last Ten Minutes to Give Hamilton Their Win Margin. Herbie Carnegie Plays Magnificently.

The Hamilton front line of Runions, Conick and Brady wasted little time after they got going on Monday night in Hamilton in the last period of the second game in the best of five series for the all-Ontario championship as they rapped in three fast goals to give the Hamilton Majors a three-goal win margin. Big Ossie Carnegie scored in the first minute of the final canto to give the Bisons an even break at that stage but just past the ten minute mark his penalty gave the Majors their big chance and they didn't waste any time.

The game was just about the same as the first game of the series and was very close all the way through but the extra effectiveness that the Majors showed up front gave them the extra goals that were needed to assure them victory.

Barney Morris, ace Bison forward, was nicked on the mouth by a puck in the first period and had to leave the ice for repairs but came back into the game again to play bang-up hockey for the rest of the night. Harold Johnston, his linemate, also turned in a solid game jarring plenty of the fleet Major forwards with his heavy body-checks.

After playing through a scoreless first period Polly Micoicivich sent the Majors into the lead as he speared Barlow's rebound and sank it behind Alex Brownlee. A couple of minutes later Herbie Carnegie, who played three-star hockey all night, picked up a loose puck and dangled in for the tying marker. A minute later Robertson sent the Majors to the front again on a pass from Micoicivich.

Ossie Carnegie came to life long enough in the last period after playing a mediocre game to sink the Bisons' second goal. He grabbed the disc outside of the blue line and dashed around the Hamilton defence to let his shot go from a few inches outside of the crease.

Ironically enough it was the man who scored the tying goal that set up the winning goal for the Majors. Ossie Carnegie tangled with Smack Allen and both were banished. Just as they came back to the ice Ossie again tangled with Allen and was given another penalty. It was while he was serving this second penalty that the Majors scored the winning goal. Brady was the marksman after taking a pass from Doug Runions. Four minutes later Conick scored on passes from Brady and Runions to make sure of the verdict and then with four minutes of play left the same forward line again roared through the Bison defence to score the game's last goal. Brady rifled the last one past Brownlee.

Bisons Drop First of Allen Cup Playdown Games to the Strong Hamilton Majors

Doug, Runions, Hamilton centre ice star, Scores Three Goals as Majors are Victorious in Three to Two Game. Brownlee Hurt in First Period but Comes Back to Finish the Game.

The Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons, Northern Ontario's hope in the Allen Cup playdowns, dropped the first game of a best of five series for the all-Ontario championship in Hamilton on Friday evening of last week, finishing on the small end of a three to two count. The Hamilton Majors had to come from behind twice to get their victory.

Alex Brownlee, stand-out goalie for the Bisons all season, suffered injury to his eye in the first period of the game and had to be taken from the ice. He later returned with seven stitches closing the gaping cut and played the rest of the game. During his absence his place between the pipes was taken by Vezna.

Doug Runions, flashy centre ice star for the O.H.A. Senior "A" champions, scored all three goals for the winners pumping in the first one in his first period after Ankerite had taken the lead and then scored two more in the third period when the Bisons had again forged to the front.

Ossie Carnegie, big coloured forward for the Bisons, scored the first goal of the game just before the four-minute mark as Nels Dixon was cooling his heels in the penalty box. The big fast-breaking forward took the puck from a Hamilton power attack and streaked up the ice to heave it past Jack Eley. Three minutes later Runions tied the count when he scored on a three-way passing play with Dillon Brady and Johnny Conick.

The close-checking Bisons, particularly their first line of the Carnegie brothers and Manny McIntyre, tied the Majors up for the rest of the first period and all of the second as they back-checked furiously and made several dangerous rushes into Hamilton territory. The two Carnegies and Manny McIntyre were without doubt the best back-checking unit on the ice and they also carried several dangerous rushes to the Hamilton goal before being stopped.

In the third period with the scored tie at 1-1, Barney Morris stepped out and sent the Bisons into the lead for the second time when he broke from a Hamilton power attack and skated in on Eley. It was a nice goal and it looked like the winner but about three minutes later Doug Runions scored his second goal of the night to bring the Majors up to a tie. He took a pass from Conick on a nice play. Four minutes later he duplicated the performance as he shot in the winning marker on a play that brought in Conick and Brady for assists.

Both goal-tenders were the game's standouts. Jack Eley had most of his hard work in the first and third periods while the majors maintained steady pressure on Brownlee.

Barney Morris Scores in Last Second to Send Herd Into Tie But Hamilton Wins in Overtime

Most Exciting Finish of the Season as Brownlee Pulled from Bisons Nets in Last Minute and Morris Scores with Fraction of a Second Left. Brownlee Turns in Magnificent Performance.

Hamilton Majors beat out Ankerite last night in the third game of their best of five series for the championship of all Ontario but before they were able to stop the Bison speedsters they had to play ten minutes of overtime. It was the first time in the history of the Porcupine Camp that an all-Ontario final has been played here and it turned out to be one of the most exciting finishes seen here for years.

In the last minute of the third period "Hobe" Essletine, Ankerite mentor, yanked Brownlee from the Bison nets and threw on six forwards. Barney Morris finally came through with the tying marker with only a

fraction of a second left to play. The game then went into overtime and Hamilton again forged to the front but just after they had scored the Bisons again scored only to have the referees disallow the goal.

There wasn't much doubt that Hamilton had the better team as their forwards skated rings around Ankerite's second line. The only forward line that the Bisons could put on the ice to match the fast Hamilton crew was their first line of the two Carnegie brothers and Manny McIntyre. All the Hamilton forwards showed polish and finish around the nets where they were deadly.

Twice Ankerite had to come from behind to tie the score and then when they did the same thing again in the overtime the goal was ruled out. Hamilton scored two fast goals in the second period after a scoreless first canto but before the period ended Manny McIntyre sifted through after taking a pass from Herbie Carnegie and got one counter back.

Ossie Carnegie rifled in the second Ankerite marker early in the third period from close in front and then Hamilton went to the front again on a goal by Barlow. In the last minute Brownlee was yanked from the nets and the Bisons turned on the heat and finally were rewarded when Barney Morris scored in the last second.

A little more than halfway through the overtime Hamilton went ahead for the last time when Robertson scored on a pass from Barlow when four men hored in on Brownlee. A couple of minutes later the Bisons scored but the referees ruled interference on the play and refused to count the goal. Clouthier slammed the rubber into the net as Ladds was sprawled in the net on top of Jack Eley.

After the last goal as well as several times during the game the ice was showered with programmes and everything else that the fans could lay their hands on.

Brownlee was one of the outstanding players on the Bison line-up along with McIntyre, Clouthier and the two Carnegies. Best for the Hamilton team were Runions, Barlow, Laurent and Eley.

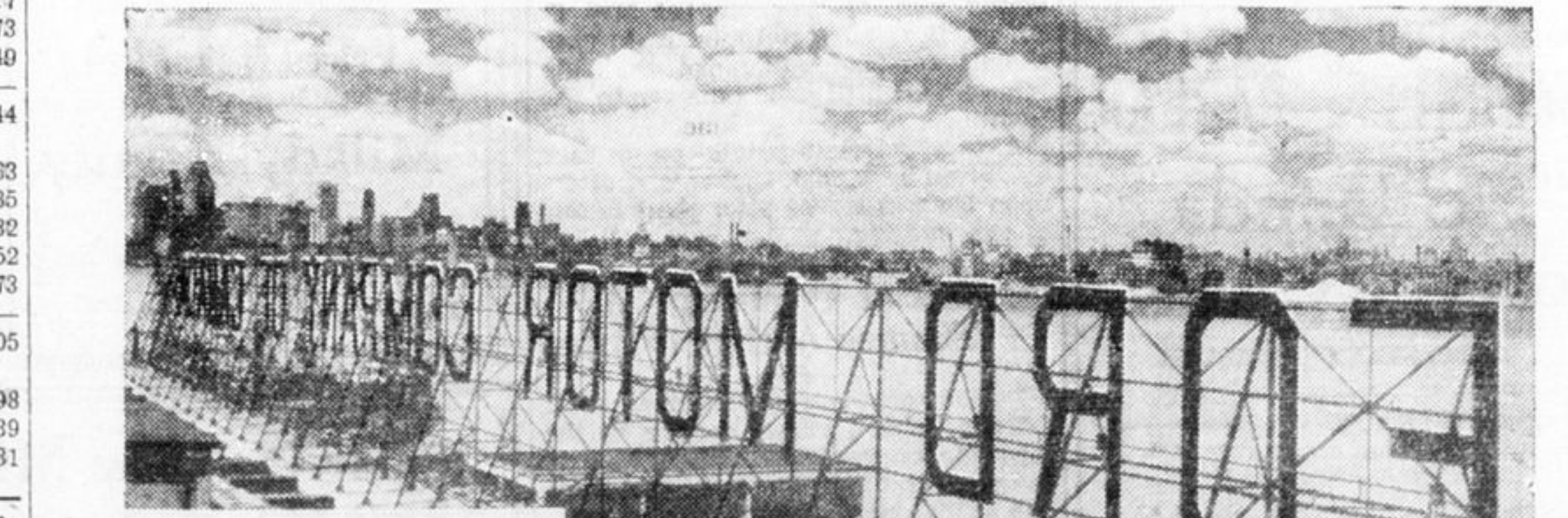

LANDMARK to Great Lakes' mariners for 27 years, the huge electric sign looking over the Detroit River from the roof of the plant of Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited at Windsor, Ontario, is being dismantled that the steel framework may be wrought into weapons to carry the fight to Hitler and the Japs. Decision to scrap the sign, which was 450 feet long with lettering 15 feet high, was made that the steel could be used for war production in the company's plant. Standing almost opposite the western tip of Belle Isle, the sign was a beacon to sailors at night and enabled wheelmen to locate the shipping channel between the Canadian shore and the island.
