Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon at the Sacred Heart Italian Church for the late Mr. Attilio Giovannelli, who passed away at his home, 151 Pine street south, on Monday, March 30th, after an illness of about one year. Service was conducted by the Rev. Fr. Fontana, and interment was made in the Timmins cemetery.

A resident of Timmins for twenty-one years, the late Mr. Giovannelli was forty-seven years old. He was formerly owner and proprietor of the Moneta Provisions. Left to mourn his loss are his wife and one daughter.

Woman Prisoner is Removed to Hospital but is Recovering

Arnelin Chenier, a woman prisoner in the Timmins Police Station, was removed to the hospital yesterday morning but this morning her condition is reported as satisfactory. She was said to be resting and should be released from the hospital in a day or so.

The woman was arrested on Tuesday evening after Magistrate Atkinson had issued a bench warrant for her arrest at Tuesday afternoon's police court, when she failed to appear to answer a charge of consuming liquor while being an interdicted person. She was reported to be sick at that time and later when brought to the hospital she was found to be suffering from acute bronchitis.

Recruiting Sergeant at Timmins Lions Club Asks for All Their Help

Sergeant T. Deas, Delivers Fine Address to Lions Club on Monday Night. Captain Countryman Called Out of Town and Unable to Speak.

The members of the Timmins Lions Club were given a genuine treat on Monday night as they sat back during their meeting to listen to a very fine address by Sergeant T. Deas, of the local recruiting office. The sergeant, who has served overseas, is stationed at the Timmins Armouries, and on Monday he volunteered to take Captain Countryman's place and give a talk to the Lions Club.

Captain Countryman had been called out of town and the replacement was just about the best that could be obtained. Sergt. Deas has first-hand information on his subject, having seen actual service in this war for more than a year.

Sergeant Deas stressed the importance of civilian defence and gave a great many facts to back up his argument. He showed how the marvelous Russian civilian defence had stopped the German drive on that country and for a contrast he showed how fast the German military machine had swept through Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Denmark, Belgium, Holland, France, Greece and Crete, because these countries had not the proper civilian defence organized. He said that they were entirely unable to cope with the gigantic war machine that the Germans had unleashed on them.

The speaker then appealed for further support to the Canadian Active Army and the Reserve Forces, stating that the greatest need at the present time was war consciousness of every individual. Canada has done much, the speaker said, and has given much, but still much more must be given before victory will be ours. The speaker said that there still was a great amount of complacency existing in Canada and that it was serious. Indifference is still more serious, he said, and must be avoided before the full victory is won.

The speaker said that the percentage of recruiting in the District of Cochrane was particularly high, ranking with any other district in the country, but that a great many more enlistments would be needed before the struggle could be finished.

The speaker appealed for recruits to both the active army and the reserve army and asked the businessmen to take a little time at night to train with the reserves. The training would prove very valuable when the time came. He gave a description of the reactions of the British people during the War Weapons Week and said that he didn't know of one town that did not either reach or pass its objective. This campaign was different to the campaigns in this country as the people were giving for nothing and were not lending with the thought that their money would be returned to them with interest. That was merely one instance of the fine response to the war effort being given by the people of England.

In conclusion the sergeant gave the Lions several suggestions for the increased war work being planned by the Lions Club. He spoke about the Army

Train that reaches Timmins tomorrow morning and asked the Lions to do everything they could to promote a fine response from the people of this district.

The Lions pledged their full support to the visit of the Army Train and left the hall with the idea of doing all that they possibly could to arouse interest in the event and decided that they will co-operate fully with the Civilian Recruiting Committee that was recently formed to assist in the district recruiting.

No business was taken up at this week's meeting, all items of this kind being left over till next Monday night.

Thinks Gold Stocks Downed on Market by Manipulation

At the annual meeting of the Preston East Dome on Monday, the former managing director, D. G. H. Wright, criticized the company's reserves were underestimated and that manipulation had been done to depress this and other gold stocks. He asked the meeting to petition the Ontario premier in the matter but a motion to this effect was voted down. It was suggested, however, that any evidence he had of market manipulation be submitted to the Attorney-General.

R. W. Brigstoke was elected to the board in place of Mr. Wright.

The annual report and financial statement were adopted and the mine manager, V. A. James, submitted a supplementary report to cover the first quarter of the year. In that three months the Preston East Dome had produced 65,000 tons averaging \$10.75 per ton. The mill was handling 720 tons per day. Mr. James said that while the labour situation was not acute, there was a growing scarcity of men. Enlistments from the company's staff totalled 140 men to date.
