Stirring Drama in New Film, "The Prime Minister"

Starring John Gielgud and Diana Wynyard.

One of the finest characterizations ever done for the screen is John Gielgud's portrayal of the great British statesman Benjamin Disraeli, in Warner Bros. "The Prime Minister," at the Cartier theatre, Monday and Tuesday, April 13th and 14th, with the added attraction, "Shadow of the Thin Man" with William Powell and Myrna Loy. The film traces Disraeli's life from his youth to his old age. His triumphs and defeats, his courtship and married life are told with deep understanding in this dramatic film biography.

Gielgud, whose "Hamlet" broke all records in New York, a few seasons ago shows that his talents are not limited to the legitimate theatre. The proof of this is, that while one is watching his performance as Disraeli, one forgets that he is seeing a role enacted but that he is actually witnessing some of the many exciting incidents in Disraeli's career.

Diana Wynyard, grand English actress, best known for her roles in "Cavalcade" and "Reunion in Vienna," plays the part of Mrs. Disraeli with much conviction. It is through her portrayal that we see the important part Disraeli's wife played in making his career the success it was. She taught him to stand by his convictions—to defy his enemies and rivals, both in political and private life—she wouldn't permit him to become tired or discouraged—and she made him swear that he would never retire from political life until he had accomplished everything he set out to do.

Many of the highlights of Disraeli's spectacular life are shown in "The Prime Minister" but one that will be particularly significant to all film-goers shows how Disraeli diplomatically out-manoeuvred the Prussian dictator, Bismarck. By showing the might of Great Britain at a most opportune time, Disraeli forced Bismarck to make a concession which saved the Empire and prevented a bloody conflict.

Besides the impressive leading cast the film has a talented array of supporting players, all of whom give very realistic performances. There's William Fyfe, who never fails to give a fine portrayal, as a political agitator—Owen Nares as Lord Derby—and Fay Compton, in the role of Queen Victoria, who perhaps more than anyone else appreciated Disraeli's great contribution to the history of the British Empire.

"The Prime Minister" was produced in Teddington, England under the very capable direction of Thorold Dickinson, who handled the film in the fine manner his magnificent story called for. Michael Hogan and Brock Williams, who wrote the screen play, did an enviable job in turning out a splendid script.

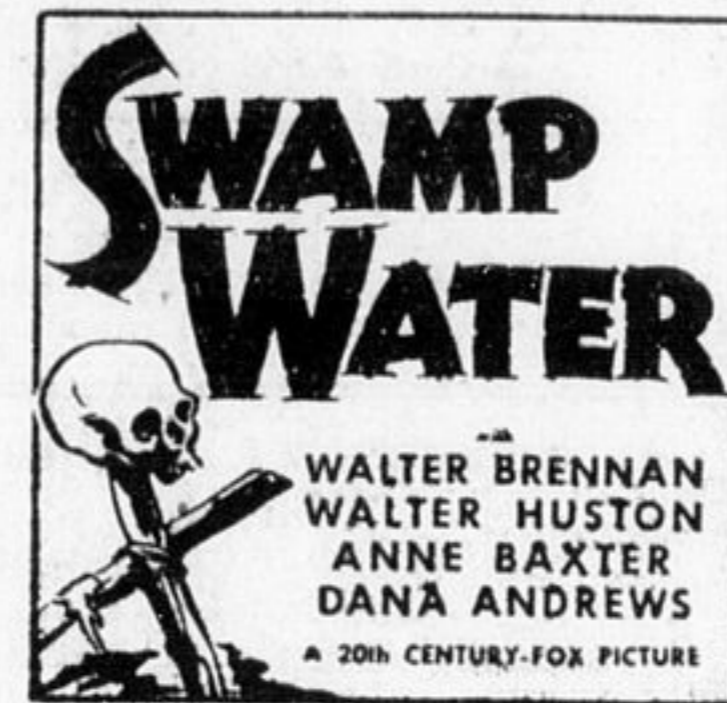

High-Powered Screen Fare in "A Yank on the Burma Road"

Introducing New Screen Star, Barry Nelson.

"A Yank on the Burma Road," which will be at the Broadway theatre, with "Born to Sing" as an added feature, Sunday midnight, Monday and Tuesday, April 13th and 14th, emphasizes the headlines you have been reading

on what has been called the "most significant highway of our day," the Burma Road.

The picture also brings a new leading man to the screen, one Barry Nelson. His vigorous and at times inspired portrayal of a cab driver forced into the spot of leading a fleet of trucks over the Burma Road is moving and heart-warming.

Laraine Day creates an unforgettable portrait of a woman's blind devotion to her man, whatever the consequences—until she sees the havoc he has wrought.

The story opens in New York with the capture, single-handed, of two killers by Nelson. He is invited to lead the caravan, wants to refuse but

is trapped by his own ego. He meets Miss Day in Rangoon. She talks herself into passage on the trucks to Chungking in order to meet her husband, held captive by the Chinese. Their trip over the Burma Road provides all the thrills, action, comedy and pathos one can ask of any film.

The members of the supporting cast represent some of the finest actors in Hollywood. With the exception of Keye Luke, however, their parts are mostly bits. Luke, as Nelson's right-hand man and interpreter, turns in an excellent performance. Among the others are Sen Yung, Phillip Ahn, Knox Manning and Matthew Boulton.

The photography, by Lester White, deserves a word of praise, as does the direction of George B. Seitz, who has captured the mood of the picture with the story credited to Gordon Kahn, Hugo Butler and David Lang.

Virginia Weidler Heads All-Youth Cast in 'Born to Sing'

Youth, Beauty, Music, Comedy, Action, in New Film.

Clever youngsters in lilting musical and dancing presentation mingled with comedy and bits of drama, provide audiences with diversified entertainment in "Born to Sing," musical of youth at the Broadway Sunday midnight, Monday and Tuesday, April 13th and 14th, as an added feature to "A Yank on the Burma Road." The picture is woven about its climax, a dramatic presentation of "Ballad for Americans," which brings to a spectacular close a show presented by the youngsters.

Their adventures lead them into trouble with the police and complications with a racketeer overlord who finally becomes their ally and "kidnaps" an audience to see their show.

"Ballad for Americans" is sung by Douglas McPhail, youthful baritone, and a chorus representing every section in American life. The number is lavishly staged.

Other song hits include "I'll Love Ya," sung by Beverly Hudson, new singing discovery; "Here I Am, Eight Years Old" sung by Darla Hood of "Our Gang" fame and a "Quiz Kids" chorus; "Two A.M.," principal love melody, sung by Virginia Weidler and Ray McDonald, with a dancing interlude; "I Hate the Conga," comedy
