Bill Rinn Wins Lions Club Trophy While MacMillian is Winner of R. J. Ennis Trophy

Some Fine Games in Finals on Sunday Afternoon. Two Competitions Were Played at Same Time. Games Were Not Won Till Last Rocks Thrown. One Game Goes to Extra End.

Two fine curling trophies were won at the McIntyre Curling Club on Sunday afternoon and evening when the rinks skipped by Bill Rinn and "Mac" MacMillian walked off with the Lions Club Trophy and the R. J. Ennis Trophy. The competition had been in progress for the past two weeks and the finals were played before a packed rink on Sunday.

Power Takes Lead in First Game of Commercial Finals

Printers Drop Three Games to Power and Have Deficit of 116 Pins to Carry Into Second Game.

Bill McHugh's Powermen took the jump on The Advance in the first of the Commercial Bowling League play-offs on Monday night at the Empire Bowling alleys when they piled up a total of one hundred and sixteen pins to carry into the second game of the play-offs. The Power team won all three games taking the first by a margin of seven pins, the second by ninety-three and the last by sixteen pins.

Tommy Bonnah led the way in the first game when he turned in a nice 329 effort but the rest of the team was far behind him and he had to concede defeat by seven pins. Bert McQuarrie led the Power with 240 while Dawson showed across a 219 score.

Frank Dawson again led the Power in the second game as he rapped out a 254 count to beat out his team-mate, Bill McHugh who had 221. Best for the printers in the second game were Tommy Bonnah and Bill Dunn with 215 each.

Both teams turned in their best efforts in the third game with the printers making an even thousand and the powermen one pin behind. The handicap gave the powermen a sixteen point lead. McHugh led the Power with 239 while Dawson added 212 and Towers 205. Fred Hornby and Harold Pirie led the printers with scores of 238 and 224 but their total was too small to cut down the margin.

Butch Tamminen and Don Hodge paced the winners with three goals each while Nelson (Shorty) Boyce and Melong counted the other two goals.

Commercial Bowling League Title Goes to Power After Thrilling Play-off Series

The Advance Went Into Last Night's Game 116 Pins Down and Cut Power's Lead to Twenty-Four. Guidice Stars for Losers While Towers Leads Powermen.

The championship of the Commercial Bowling League was decided last night at the Empire Bowling Alleys when the Power and the Advance met in the second game of their two-game playoff series. Power had taken a 116 pin lead in the first set of games and last night their lead was cut down but they still edged out the winners by a margin of twenty-four pins.

Alfie Guidice paced the losers throughout the night, rolling a total for his three games of 717 while Bonnah turned in a 648 point for the losers but their totals were short of the Power totals. Teddy Towers was the best the Power had to offer with 673 and Doner turned in a count of 690 while the rest of the team were far behind.

Guidice's 245 paced the printers to the first game when they took the session by seventy-eight pins to cut down the Power lead. In the second game, however, the Power lashed back, led by Teddy Towers and Frank Dawson, who rolled 245 and 241, to take the game by seventy-three pins and to make the position of the printers very precarious in the last game. Tommy Bonnah turned in a nice 239 count in the second game for the printers while Guidice hammered the pins for a count of 227.

Fighting back furiously and more than a hundred pins down, the printers took the last game but their total pinfall was twenty-four short of the Power total. Guidice led the slaughter with 245 while Bill Dunn rolled 233 and Tommy Bonnah scored 212 to give the printers a total of 1088, enough to beat out the Power by 87 pins but not enough to take the championship. Towers turns in a 226 count for the powermen while Doner rolled 220.

Unless the Leafs give the dope bucket a good healthy kick they will return home next Monday without the Stanley Cup. In the present season the Wings have been particularly hot on their own ice and have won the last twelve games that they have played at home. On the other hand the Leafs have had very little luck on Detroit ice all year.

The Stanley Cup is in possession of the Boston Bruins right now but they are ready to hand it over to either the Wings or the Leafs as soon as the present series is over. The Bruins were eliminated last week by the Wings while the Leafs eliminated the Rangers to qualify for the final series.

Another obstacle that the Leafs will have to pass is that no team has ever dropped the first two games in the Stanley Cup finals and then gone on to win the title. A few teams have dropped the first game and then won out but it is usually the team that wins the first game that gets the championship.

Printers Take Away Last Chance of Gambles Entering Play-Offs by Taking Two Points.

The two men were Pete Nicolson with 242 and W. Robinson 225.

Robinson stepped out in the second game to score 251 and to lead his team to their only point of the night. Nicolson again rapped in a score over the two hundred mark with 216. Best for the printers was Bill Dunn with 259.

Guidice again took over the spotlight in the last game and practically won the game singlehanded as he counted for one third of his team's points. His 327 was by far the best on the sheet while Davidson took the second honours with 227. Best the fritters had to offer was Pete Nicolson with 233 and Robinson with 205.

Detroit Takes Important First Game by Three to Two Score on Saturday.

Don, (The Count) Grosso, former Kirkland Lake star, was the fair-haired boy on the Detroit team scoring two goals, the first and the last, to give his team three to two victory. Syd Abel scored the other one in the first period. Sweeney Schirmer and Johnny McCree scored Toronto's two goals in the opening session.

The fast-skating Detroit team never behind as they pumped in the first goal of the game in the first two minutes of play. Before the first period was over each team had scored twice and then Grosso scored the winning goal about halfway through the second canto.

Flyers Down Aces in First Game of Eastern Finals

Oshawa Generals won their fourth eastern Canada championship in the last five years last night in Toronto when they met the Montreal Royals in the fourth game of their best of seven series in the Memorial Cup play-downs.
