Firemen Handle Eleven Calls in Less Than 2 Hours

Tuesday Noon Was Busiest filtered through that the Jans were Time Firemen Have Had bombarding the forts in a real heavy for Long Time.

Busiest day the firemen have experienced for some time was last Tuesday when they answered eleven calls for chimney fires in less than two hours. First call came in at 12.02 and the last call was just before two o'clock. The high wind at the time was blamed for the fires and damage was very little in any of the fires. At one time all the trucks in the fire hall were out at the same time.

About two hours after that rush the firemen were again called out and this time the fire was of a more serious nature. A fire had started in the roof in Hong Kong and Kowloon. It was of a house at 201 Pine street south, and also disclosed that another 70 civilians firemen used 250 feet of hose and 361 feet of ladder to battle the blaze. The loss amounted to about \$75.
