

The late Mr. Hassett died after a short illness, on Monday night, in Porcupine General hospital, of pneumonia. He was a well-known figure in the North, having resided in Cobalt in 1904 and 1905. A carpenter and mechanic, he helped build the headframes on the earliest mines in Cobalt. He left Cobalt for Sudbury in 1919 and was bereaved of his wife in town in 1921.

In 1923 he came to the Porcupine Camp and was employed for some years at the Coniaurum Mine. In 1940 he found employment at the Hoyle, Broulan and Bonetal Mines.

His one daughter lives in S. Porcupine, Mrs. O. Dacre, and he leaves two grandchildren.

One brother, Fred, of Cobalt, and a sister also of Cobalt, were present at the funeral.
