#### Dies from Injuries Suffered in Mine Accident in April

Frank Falica, Jugo-Slavian, aged 39 years, died on Friday last at the Porcupine General Hospital at South Porcupine, as the result of injuries sustained in an accident at the Buffalo-Ankerite Mine on April 28th. He was scaling from a staging in 1703 West Stope at the mine when a large piece cf loose weighing about 100 lbs. dropped, striking the staging and breaking it. The man was thrown to the stope floor some fifteen and a half feet below. Seven ribs were broken on the left side and evidently the lung was punctured by one of the ribs, and this, with secondary shock, affected other internal organs, and caused his death.
