Lawrence Defoe, who will give a recital in the auditorium of the McIntyre Community Building on Tuesday evening, May 26th, is perhaps one of Canada's best known and most popular tenors. Primarily known for his individual ability as a soloist, Mr. Defoe is also the director of the Lawrence Defoe Singers, and is well-known as the choir leader at Woodgreen United Church, Toronto, and as the director of several broadcast programmes by the group.



Mr. Defoe has broadcast over five of Toronto's radio stations, and his voice is known to practically every resident of that great city. He has appeared at numerous concerts in other cities and towns in Canada. The soloist studied under Mr. Arthur Blight, Wm. Shakespeare, of London, England and Edgar Schofield, of New York.

In commenting on one of Mr. Defoe's recitals, the Toronto Star, through its music critic, Augustus Bridle, said "Mr. Lawrence Defoe is a tenor of pure lyric quality, flexible, ingenious and delightful. Timmins Motorist Faces Serious Traffic Charge

Adelard Aubertin, 33-year-old Timmins miner, residing at 59 Balsam street north, was remanded yesterday morning on a charge of failing to remain at the scene of accident. He pleaded not guilty to the charge and bail was set at two hundred dollars.

The charge against Aubertin was laid as a result of an accident at the corner of Spruce street and Third Avenue, shortly before eleven o'clock Tuesday evening. The police were called to the scene by one of the drivers and when they appeared they found that the other driver had left before their arrival. One witness told of seeing the car proceed along Spruce street so the police gave chase. They located the car parked in front of the Timmins Garage some time later and found that it had the left front fender torn off. The driver had disappeared, however.

As the police were leaving the car they saw the driver approach and get into the car. Constable Conrad Beaulne flashed his light to the driver but he failed to heed the warning. The constable was forced to jump onto the running board of the car and open the door to put on the emergency brake to stop the car.

Armand Bradette, 273 Birch street south was the driver of the other vehicle involved in the accident and he said that he had been proceeding west on Third Avenue in his truck when the Aubertin car ran through the stop street at Third Avenue and hooked the rear end of his truck. Damage to the truck amounted to about three dollars, while damage to the car amounted to more than thirty dollars.
