Temperature was Fifty-Four Degrees at Eight O'clock This Morning.

Fair and moderately warm weather is in store for the residents of this district for the next day or so according to the weather forecast issued from the Hollinger weather bureau this morning, with the temperature starting off at eight o'clock this morning with a reading of fifty-four degrees it was expected that it would be quite warm today. The temperatures during the past week have been ranging high and low, with most of the days being very warm and considerably cooler at night. The variation in the temperatures averaged about twenty degrees each day. High for the week was on Monday afternoon when the mercury jumped to seventy-three degrees and the low was on Saturday and Sunday nights with a reading of thirty-one degrees. During the past week a little more than a quarter of an inch of rain fell, the actual amount being .29 inches. Temperatures for the past week were: Thursday, max. 56, min. 40; Friday, max. 65, min. 46; Saturday, max. 51, min. 31; Sunday max. 58, min. 31; Monday, max. 73, min. 40; Tuesday, max. 47, min. 38; Wednesday, max. 67, min. 44; this morning at eight o'clock, 54 degrees.
