Large Amount of Gold Ore Donated to the Red Cross

Plan of Ontario Prospectors and Developers' Association Means Much for Red Cross.

Some time ago the Ontario Prospectors' and Developers' Association, through one of its officers, R. Anson Cartwright, initiated a Red Cross Gold Fund, through which prospectors and mining companies could donate samples of gold ore which would be melted and sold for the benefit of the Red Cross.

Altogether 750 pounds of gold ore samples have been donated and this will be turned over to the Temiskaming Testing Laboratory at Cobalt for refining.

The Canadian mint has also agreed to purchase the proceeds and the proceeds will go to the Red Cross to provide comforts for the men of the Royal Canadian Navy, the Canadian Active Service Forces, and the Royal Canadian Air Force, as well as for bombed out civilians in the United Kingdom.

One consignment of ore has already been processed at the University of Toronto and yielded a bar five inches long, an inch wide and three quarters of an inch thick, worth \$755. Donations to date have included a specimen valued at \$225 and another nugget from an old Klondyke prospector worth \$25. The Royal Ontario Museum has purchased one specimen for purposes of display for \$125 and four other smaller specimens for \$30.

Mining companies and prospectors who may have interesting specimens in their possessions are urged to send them, either to the Prospectors' and Developers' Association, Royal Bank Building, or to Mr. Cartwright's office 350 Bay Street, Toronto, or they may be delivered to any provincial mining recorder's office.

When the English factory workers opened them they found 43 tins of evaporated milk tucked into each case with the tools. The milk is intended for your children. We trust this food will be distributed where it is most needed." It was, it was sent to bombed-out children in a heavily-raided area near Paris. Daughters of Empire to Plan Programme at Montreal Meet

Annual Meeting to be held in Montreal May 30th to June 4th.

The Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, will hold their 42nd annual meeting in Montreal May 30 to June 4. Eight hundred delegates, members and friends are expected to attend the sessions which commence this coming Saturday with an open meeting in the evening when Her Royal Highness The Princess Alice will be guest speaker.

Forty thousand members of the Order across Canada will be represented at the convention which will review the extensive work of the I.O.D.E. that covers three main phases of activity. While war projects will be featured in business sessions, chapters' continuing peace-time work will be thoroughly discussed and readjustment problems which a post war Canada must meet will receive attention from delegates. A broad programme will be again introduced for direction of the far-reaching activities of the Order into the most effective channels.

Scope of the Order's contribution to primarily war causes is indicated by the list of funds on which committee conveners will report. The list includes: Polish relief; bombed civilians; "Jed" comforts for the Forces; British soldiers, sailors and airmen's family welfare; camp libraries; national war guest fund; Lord Mayor's fund (London); British prisoners of war; services centre fund; women's auxiliary Territorial service fund; Britian's fire-fighter's fund; Women's Auxiliary Air Force of Britain.

Tons of clothing, field comforts, blankets, magazines, books and gifts have reached Britain in addition to the thousands of dollars sent for the purchase of aircraft equipment there. Articles valued at many thousands of dollars have been distributed to men and women of the services in Canada, to the Navy, merchant marine and minesweepers. Detailed accounts of the vital and wide contribution of women in Canada through the I.O.D.E. will be presented on every phase of the Order's endeavour to aid where it is most needed.
