Milks was defended by Lawyer Greg, ory Evans who produced references as to character from the Kirkland Lake mine at which defendant was employed before coming to Preston East Dome in March.

Constable Orr, of the Preston East Dome gave evidence that defendant was employed as a "picker" on the conveyor belt. On July 27th he saw him hammering on a sledge hammer with a bar. He took something and placed it in a tobacco package on the floor. When the constable asked him what he had there he showed him the gold ore he had been hammering also five small pieces in the tobacco package.

He stated to the Chief Constable (Abrahams) that he had no intention of taking these specimens out of the mill. A young man who had not seen a good specimen of gold had asked him to show him one should he come across it. Defendant swore he had every intention of putting it back on the belt after his young co-worker had had a look at it. "It was a crazy thing to do," he admitted to the Constable.

W. F. Mason, assayer at Dome Mines, said that the larger two pieces of gold which had been given to him to value were worth approximately \$2.15

## South Porcupine Miner to be Buried at Poltmore, Que.

South Porcupine, Aug. 5.—(Special to The Advance)—We are sorry to record the tragic death of a South Porcupine resident—Mr. Russell Clemis—of 85 Summer St. Lakeview, which occurred in Porcupine General Hospital on Tuesday evening around 9 p.m., after accident at the Buffalo-Ankerite Mines.

The accident occurred shortly before 9 p.m. in the 1489 stope where Mr. Clemis was employed as a scraper operator. He was struck by falling rock when he was working in changing scraper cables about thirty feet from where blasting had been in operation shortly before. Loose rock fell without warning from the stope back upon Clemis who was crushed beneath it. He suffered several fractures of legs and arms and internal injuries. He was attended immediately by mine doctors before being removed to hospital where death occurred.

We extend our sympathies to his widow and other relatives in town.

The deceased was born in 1904 in Poupore, Quebec, and came to South Porcupine to reside 9½ years ago. A brother, Leonard, and a sister, Mrs. Nitchke, also live in South Porcupine. Another sister, Mrs. Thompson, resides in North Bay, and a sister in Flint, Michigan. All are expected to accompany the body on Thursday to Poltmore, near Buckingham Que., where interment will take place.

The funeral services are being at Hunkin's Funeral Parlors until Thursday.
