Gallant Sea Officer Honored



CAPTAIN PERCY AMBROSE KELLY, Chief Officer of the Canadian National Steamship "Lady Hawkins" when that vessel was sunk by an enemy submarine on the evening of February 19, 1942, was recently honored by the Dominion Government for conspicuous gallantry shown on that occasion. The testimonial took the form of a silver tray on which the following inscription was engraved:

"Presented by the Government of Canada to Percy Ambrose Kelly, Chief Officer, R.M.S. Lady Hawkins, for meritorious conduct when the vessel was sunk without warning by an enemy submarine on the night of February 19, 1942."

The presentation took place in the Nova Scotian hotel at Halifax, Captain Kelly receiving the government's token at the hands of C. H. Hosterman, Marine Agent for the Department of Transport at Halifax, representing Hon. C. D. Howe, Acting Transport Minister.

In the photograph Captain Kelly is seen holding the silver tray, and on his immediate left is Mr. Hosterman.

On Mr. Kelly's right is Captain Charles Waterhouse, Superintendent of Pilots, Halifax. In the centre background is W. G. Miller, Halifax manager, Canadian National Steamships, who represented R. B. Teakle, General Manager. Standing in the foreground next to Mr. Hosterman is Arthur Randles, Director of Merchant Seamen at Ottawa.

A message of congratulation from Mr. Teakle said: "Mr. Kelly throughout the trying period displayed the high qualities of those who go down to the sea in ships."

Captain Kelly was in charge of a lifeboat containing 76 persons which was adrift four days before being sighted by a rescue ship. The official account of the event cites that "Captain Kelly showed gallantry in staying to assist in the lowering of other boats after his own was safely away. His judgment in all things was above discussion. His leadership and friendly discipline were first-class. His seamanship was good. Not one person in the lifeboat ever criticized him. All considered him deserving of honor."

Immediately, everyone was all smiles and the motorist laughingly complied as onlookers commented on the Solomonian wisdom of "Judge" Gauthier. If one of the tickets in the book the Schumacher motorist purchased should wind up the car, the ends of justice would be even more happily served.

Kitchener, Ont., Aug. 12—Chief Harold Walton of New Toronto yesterday warned more than 100 fire chiefs here attending the 24th annual meeting of the Dominion Association of Fire Chiefs of the possibility of gas attacks and added "the Germans and Japanese have broken every other rule of the game, so why not this one?"

Chief Walton, who recently completed a civilian defence course, said civilian defence organizations are essential to curb the effectiveness of bombers.

Chief W. A. Spalding of Preston, Ont. president of the Canadian Association, declared "we must not feel that we are so secure it can't happen here; it can. Preparedness should be our watchword."

Schumacher Man Finds Interesting Sequel to Accident

New Scheelite Find Reported 40 Miles From Kirkland Lake

Kirkland Man Tells of Ore Discoveries.

Kirkland Lake, Aug. 12—A new scheelite deposit has been located in Desserat Township 40 miles from Kirkland Lake. Don Hurd, president of the Donrud Prospecting Syndicate told the Northern News today. Mr. Hurd said he had a surface crew at the property engaged in initial development work. He stated a diamond drill was being moved to the claims immediately to explore the possibilities of the find.

"The average tungsten values from samples of our ore submitted to the Department of Mines and the Noranda Assay Office show tungsten-tri-oxide values for \$12 a ton. We have been doing considerable sampling for gold and have found the ore's gold content to be nine dollars a ton. This gives us a total value of \$21 per ton. We often find traces of gold when searching for scheelite.

"We have installed fluorescent ray system which has proven invaluable. Our present program is designed to give us information as to the dimensions, structure and tungsten content of the ore. We hold our property under an option agreement from Upstream Gold Mines and we have staked ten claims adjoining our present holdings. The development is accessible to the highway being only two miles from the main Kirkland Lake-Noranda road," said Mr. Hurd.

Alleged Armed Resistance Denied by Mounted Police

Ottawa, Aug. 13—Commissioner S. T. Wood of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police said to-day his force "has not met with any armed resistance in the Province of Quebec or elsewhere" in carrying out personal deliveries of call-up notices or in dealing with deserters from the armed forces.

The commissioner had been asked for comment on a report, from a source closely associated with those enforcing the call-up regulations, that R.C.M.P. constables delivering call-up notices in the Quebec City area had met armed resistance in several instances in recent weeks.

Expect New U-Boat Drive in Southern Atlantic

London, Aug. 12—A large-scale offensive by German surface and submarine raiders against the heavy and increasingly important Allied merchant traffic in the South Atlantic was predicted today by informed British naval sources.

Reports from neutral and Axis sources in last 24 hours indicated, it was said, the attacks already had started.

These sources cited Rio de Janeiro's receipt of SOS messages reporting an enemy surface raider 1,000 miles off the Brazilian coast and the German high command's claim of yesterday that 45-231 tons of shipping bound for Egypt had been sunk recently by German submarines off the American and West African coasts.
