Chief at Cobalt Has Chase After Much-Wanted Man

Accused of Stealing Car, Desertion from Army, Forgery, Etc.

COBALT, Aug. 26-Friday morning last Chief Andrew Cote received word from the police department at Parry Sound to pick up Dinat Ladouceur, Cobalt resident, wanted in that town on a charge of theft allegedly committed last June. Learning that he had been seen in town the Chief started to look for him and secured the services of some of the Provincial police at Halleybury. Then he discovered the wanted man had broken into the home of his brother and taken away a parka, a mackinaw coat and an overcoat.

The search continued until the early hours of the morning with no trace of the man being found and the provincials went home leaving the chief to continue the search. He secured the assistance of W. McRae, who acted as chief during his holidays and W. Frabon, both members of the Fire Department and both special constables. They finally saw their man near the Square, and he took to his heels with McRae and Frabon in hot pursuit while the chief went to the north end of the town to head the quarry off.

The pursuers saw their man dart into a house, the door of which was open and when the chief came along he went in, finally locating the wanted man hiding under a chesterfield in a space about six inches high. He was taken to the police office and locked up. When questioned he admitted he had sold the car to an auto wrecking firm in Parry Sound, and the police of that town, when notified, later advised Chief Cote that Ladouceur was wanted, not only for car theft, but forgery as well. The clothing stolen in Cobalt was located in a local second hand store where the accused had disposed of it for \$3.

Ladouceur was in the army for a time but was listed as a deserter on more than one occasion. Arrested in Kirkland Lake, he made his escape from his escort at Englehart, while being taken back to North Bay, and, on another occasion he escaped from the local lock up, while being held for an escort to take him down below. He will come up before Acting Magistrate Gould at Halleybury on Friday.
