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Funeral Saturday of Well-Known Esteemed Resident

Robert Gray, Sr., Laid to Rest with Legion Honours

The funeral of Robert Gray, Sr., was held Saturday afternoon, with service at the First United Church conducted by Rev. W. M. Mustard, the Timmins branch of Legion attending in a body. The attendance at the funeral was very large testifying to the honour in which the late Mr. Gray was held. He was buried in the family plot at the Timmins cemetery.

The late Robert Gray was born in Durham County, England and served as a ship captain in the merchant marine in the last war. He came to Timmins in 1922 and until a year ago was a boilerman at the Hollinger. Illness forced his retirement last year, and for some months he had been confined to his bed. He passed away Thursday morning at the age of 79 years. He enjoyed the high regard of all and is mourned by a wide circle of friends. His wife predeceased him in 1936. He is survived by five sons, Robert Gray, 25 Fourth avenue; one daughter, Mrs. J. Chalmers, 168 Cedar street, Mrs. J. Goodman, 227 Hemlock street, Mrs. A. Darling, Toronto, Mrs. J. D'Earny, Sydney, Australia, and Mrs. A. Wallace Aberdeen, Scotland. Six grandsons are serving in the Armed Forces.
