South Porcupine, Oct. 21—(Special to The Advance)—Next Sunday evening at 8.10 a Victory Parade will be formed and proceed from the Town Hall to the local theatre. Schumacher Man Passenger on the Ill-Fated Caribou

AC2 Raymond Chatson Reported Among Missing.

Schumacher, Oct. 21st. Special to The Advance. Quite a gloom was cast over the town last Thursday when it became known that A.C. 2 Raymond (Sonny) Chatson of the Royal Canadian Air Force, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Chatson, 61½ First avenue, was a passenger on the ill-fated steamer "Caribou" torpedoed in the Cabot strait en route to Newfoundland last Wednesday, October 14. Mr. and Mrs. Chatson were notified the next day that their son was listed as missing and this week a letter of verification was received by the parents from the Department of National Defence.

Born in Schumacher, "Sonny" attended the Schumacher Public and High School. He also attended Albert College, Belleville, where he took a year's course in "Business and Finance." He joined the R.C.A.F. on January 4th, 1942, a month before his 18th birthday, and while waiting for his call he was employed in the Electric Shop at the McIntyre Mine. Stationed with the R.C.A.F. at St. Thomas he was among the fifteen who were transferred to Newfoundland, leaving St. Thomas on Thursday, October 8th for Halifax and leaving Halifax, Wednesday, October

14th for Newfoundland. Mr. and Mrs. Chatson are esteemed residents of Schumacher and the sympathy of the whole community goes out to them in their sad bereavement. Sympathy is also extended (Jean) Mrs. Kenneth Adamson, Third Ave., only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chatson. Requiem High Mass was said Monday morning at St. Alphonsus Parish Church. AC2 Raymond Chatson's death is the first casualty among the local boys.
