Wider Fields Open to R.C.A.F. Women in Standard Trades

Assistant Section Officer Mustard with R. C. A. F. Recruiting Unit Here.

Assistant Section Officer Mustard of the Women's Division of the R.C.A.F. is here with the Recruiting Unit to be in Timmings until Saturday of this week. She pointed out this week to The Advance that there is a very wide field for young women in the R.C.A.F., W.D., and she is ready and anxious to explain to any young lady in the town or district the distinct service that can be given to the country and to the cause in the Women's Division. Any young woman who wants to serve that men may be released for actual flying should visit the R.C.A.F. Recruiting office in the basement of the post office building and ask for Assistant Section Officer Mustard.

Two special lines may be mentioned. The stenography course for women in the R.C.A.F., and what is known as Standard Tradeswomen. Owing to the ever increasing shortage of trained stenographers, the R.C.A.F. is now training women at a special 20-week course. Intelligent applicants of high character who are physically fit can qualify for this course. Previous experience is not necessary. Trainees are paid \$13.00 per week while studying. The age limits are 16 to 40. Details may be obtained at the recruiting centre in the post office basement.

Standard Tradeswomen was introduced into the R.C.A.F. because it was found that many girls with matriculation or college degrees applying for enlistment did not have the training required for the openings available. As a consequence, it was decided that any well qualified girl was to be enlisted under the category of "standard tradeswoman." During her basic training she would be called before a selection board to determine the specialized trade for which she is best fitted, due thought being given to her own preference. Girls proficient in mathematics are trained at Toronto University as meteorological observers. Those with specially high intelligence may be considered for clerk operations room. Clerk accountants equipment assistants, postal clerks, transport drivers and a score of other lines are open.

Sub-Committee of Prices Board Formed at South Porcupine

South Porcupine, Nov. 4th. Special to The Advance.
A meeting was held on Friday evening in the council chamber of the town hall for the purpose of forming a local branch or sub-committee of the War-time Prices and Trade Board. In spite of several other important functions called for Friday (S.J.A.B. inspection in Schumacher and local visit of the Grand President to the local Rebekah lodge) we are glad to state that around 35 interested ladies were present to hear Mrs. E. H. Young, of North Bay, give a most enlightening and interesting talk on the work and purpose of this new war time Board.
"Women working together have performed miracles," said the speaker. "This is a great economic measure—so good that the U.S. is copying us. There is nothing greater than maintaining the living standard of average people, and in protecting commodities from soaring prices we are preventing inflation with its attendant evils. Its purpose is to prevent inflation; to make women take an active interest in price control; to report rises in prices to the right source; and to assist in the community accepting rationing shortage without grumbling."
This local committee will meet once a month. The paper, "Consumers' News," will be distributed monthly which will give the price ceiling on goods.
