Pioneer Resident of Haileybury Dies in Her 91st Year

Mrs. Charles Austin Came North Forty Years Ago.

The death of one of the pioneer residents of the North was recorded last week by The Haileyburian, as follows:—"Another pioneer resident of Haileybury passed away on Sunday last, November 8, 1942, in the person of Mrs. Jessie Jane Austin, widow of the late Charles Austin, who came to this town in its infancy, saw the community grow from its small beginning and passed through more than one disaster in the form of fire, the last of which occurred just over 20 years ago when her home was destroyed with the greater part of the town. Mrs. Austin was in her 91st year and continued active until a week before her death, which took place at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Chas. Elliott, in Bourlambaque, Que. It was on May 23rd, 1922, in company with her husband and young family that Mrs. Austin first came to Haileybury, making the trip up Lake Temiskaming by boat before the railway was built. Until 1934 she had her home in town, before going to the Quebec mining centre to live with her daughter. Mr. Austin died here on February 12, 1910.

"Born in Renfrew county, Mrs. Austin spent her early life there, later going to Haliburton and from there to the North. Before her marriage she was Miss Jessie Jane Scott, daughter of pioneer residents of Renfrew. Of a family of seven children, there are five

surviving, the majority of them well-known in the North Country. There are four sons, Stanley in Toronto; Milton of the Beattie Mine, Duparquet; Charles, Larder Lake, and Frederick of Haileybury. Mrs. Elliott (Mabel) is the surviving daughter. One son, Norman, was killed while serving overseas in the last great war and a daughter, Agnes, died in 1910, only a few weeks after her father's death.

"Mrs. Austin was a former Presbyterian and later a member of the United Church, in which she took a deep interest as she did in all community affairs. She was well known to a large circle of friends and highly respected in the communities where she had made her home, a respect that was made evident in the many beautiful floral tributes sent.

"The funeral was held in Haileybury yesterday afternoon, with the service at the home of her daughter-in-law Mrs. N. Austin, Brewer street, and interment in the Old Cemetery beside the grave of her husband. Rev. A. P. Addison conducted the services in the presence of a large number of friends and members of the family.
