

Miss Levinson's Class (7 to 9 yearolds) were very excited when she read them the letter sent by H. H. Crawford of the S.S. Aikaterini-too long to be given here in full. He says, "I am a Navy gunner and I am always aboard merchant ships. My present ship is a Greek one and all the crew are Greeks except my friend and myself. Of course some of them can speak a little English and I have learned a little of the Greek language so I can talk to them and we are a friendly crowd. I expect that your teacher has taught you all about the German occupied countries so you will know that Greece at present is ruled by the Germans. All of my Greek shipmates have families and relatives at home and as they have not had any letters from Greece since 1940 they worry a great deal and I feel sorry for them.—Anyway I hope this war will soon be ended so that they may go home again and find their loved ones safe and well."

This sailor goes on to describe to the children very graphically the part of England that he comes from-is looking forward to having a photograph of the class (which is being sent), and concludes:--"I can't express my feelings of gratitude for what you have done for me, so once again thank you all and God bless you."
