Much Patriotic and Community Work Accomplished. Reports of Officers for Past Year. Mrs. Keene, Retiring Regent, Honoured by Members. Mrs. Wm. Mackie the Regent for Ensuing Term.

The Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire Golden Chapter, held their 24th annual meeting in the council chambers of the municipal building, Tuesday evening, Feb. 2nd, with Mrs. James Keene, Regent, presiding.

The meeting opened in the usual manner, and Mrs. Wm. Mackie, the secretary, read the minutes of the previous annual report for the year 1941-1942.

At this juncture, the reports of officers for the year 1942-1943 were submitted. Mrs. Mackie gave the report for the year as follows:—There were 10 regular meetings, and 3 executive meetings. The Chapter was represented at many patriotic and business meetings, including Wartime Prices and Trade Board Consumers branch, Timmins Welfare Federation, Christmas Seals, and Red Cross sewing.

The members sponsored the tag day for the blind in May 1942, receipts being \$754.23.

Members were present at meeting of the Navy League Corporation, at the Girl Guide tea and banquet. The Regent, Mrs. James Keene, was a guest at the banquet given in honour of the Chinese Ambassador, Dr. Fung. On March 18th, 1942, the Chapter held a fashion show and tea at Bucovetsky's store.

In April, there was a presentation of a War Bond to Mr. F. MacNamara. This was his scholarship money.

On May 6th, 1942, the Chapter held a May-time tea at the home of the treasurer, Mrs. R. Anderson. On May 26th, the Chapter held their 23rd anniversary at the home of the 1st vice-regent, Mrs. A. F. Carriere.

In September, the Chapter worked in co-operation with the Timmins Welfare Federation. In October, the Chapter filled twenty-five sailors ditty bags. On Nov. 11th, an Armistice "At Home" was held at the home of Mrs. G. S. Lowe, 11 Hemlock street. On December 16th, the Chapter sponsored a banquet for the blind of the district.

Owing to the illness of the War Work convener, Mrs. A. Booker, the war work report will be published at a later date.

Mrs. Geo. Hale, the Educational secretary reported that supplies had been purchased for the adopted school at Red Stone. The donation sent to the Lucy Memorial Fund was also reported.

Mrs. Warnock, the Hospital convener reported that several sewing meetings had been held at St. Mary's Hospital, and that a bedspread had been donated. 76 dresses and 25 diapers were made for the nursery, St. Mary's Hospital supplying the material.

For the South Porcupine Hospital 31 dresses were made, 2 dozen crib spreads, 16 crib sheets, 1 dozen baby blankets were donated by the chapter.

Mrs. Ed. Robinson, convener of the Committee for the Blind, reported twenty-five visits to the blind made by the committee, the tag-day held, and the banquet.

The Guide Convener, Mrs. S. Wheeler, read her report on both companies of I.O.D.E. Girl Guides:—

The 19th company of Guides reported that they held a tea in June, sent a box to an unknown soldier, and are at present working on a quilt which will be sent to the Bomb Victims, through Guide headquarters. Capt. Bailey was promoted to district Captain.

The 31st Company of Girl Guides held a tea in the spring, attended summer camp with Camp Commandant Mrs. Osborne in charge. The Guides made a quilt which was given to the Chapter, to be sent to the Bomb Victims. They held a banquet this December in the Hollinger Hall.

Donations of \$150.00 from the Preston East Dome and \$25.00 from the Buffalo-Ankerite were received.

Reports were also presented by Mrs. C. Pozzetti, Mrs. J. Theriault, and Mrs. Dorschener.

At this time, the Regent, Mrs. Keene, introduced Mr. McManus, of the National War Finance Board, also Mr. Tod of the Bank of Montreal, and Postmaster King, all of whom addressed the meeting on the necessity of war Stamp Sales. This led to the request that the I.O.D.E. Chapter would sponsor this project. It was later decided that the Golden Chapter would act as Chairman for this district as a war-time job.

Before the election of the new officers, Mrs. A. F. Carriere presented to the retiring Regent, Mrs. J. Keene, a gift from the Chapter expressing the thanks of the Chapter for the work done by the Regent during her period of leadership.

Accidental Death of Eino Arthur Oikari at Kapuskasing

Funeral Held Here on Tuesday This Week.

The funeral service for Eino Arthur Oikari of 57 Birch Street North, Timmins, was conducted by the Reverend A. I. Heinenon in the Chapel of Walker's Funeral Home Tuesday, Feb. 2nd, at 5:30 p.m., in presence of many friends from Timmins and district.

Mr. Oikari was killed Sunday morning, Jan. 31st, when he was struck by a train one mile West of Kapuskasing. It is thought that he was walking too close to the track when the train passed and was drawn against the cars by the force of the train.

The late Mr. Oikari was born at Kar-

stula, Vaasa Province, Finland, on April 24th, 1901. He was single, although engaged to be married this Spring. His father died a few years ago in Finland at Karstula, where his mother and several brothers and sisters are still living. He has one brother living in the United States, but no relatives in Canada. He came to Canada in July of 1926, and was widely known throughout Northern Ontario.
