Purposes of C.G.I.T. Week Explained, Weekly Meeting Held

February 7th to the 14th is national Canadian Girls In Training week in Canada. It has three purposes. First, it provides the opportunity for interpreting C.G.I.T. to the local church, to parents and to the other teen-age girls. Second, it is a time when Canadian Girls in Training all over Canada re-think their purpose and the possibilities of C.G.I.T. Third, it secures contributions from C.G.I.T. groups to finance the activities of the Ontario Girls' Work Board. This Board assists C. G. I. T. in all denominations in the province and is concerned with the religious development of teen-age girls. It is financed by contributions from C.G.I.T. groups. The budget provides an office and supply depot, salaries, travel expenses, the "Torch," (a monthly magazine for leaders), and other free material.
