

McIntyre Score Three Goals on Breakaways to Win From the Hollinger Greenshirts 6 to 4

Porter Was Unbeatable Last Friday, and Saved the Game for the Miners— Only Four Out of Fifty-One Shots Beat Him. Beare Stops Ten Out of Sixteen.

It was a hard game for the Hollinger to lose as they had the upper hand all through the game but could not get the rubber behind Porter who saved shots that could not be seen in scrimmages in front of the goal.

McCoy scored two goals on breakaways. The second was scored the hard way, getting into the clear after Schwab and McKay sandwiched him. Turcotte got the other goal on a breakaway.

The game was one of the fastest this season in the league, and the Hollinger will have to fight hard to get into the play-offs.

Hollinger went on the offensive at the drop of the puck, and after testing Porter out with three shots, Gordon flipped in Petrucci's perfect pass from the left boards.

McIntyre combined and Drummond sent in a hard drive which Beare stopped. McComb grabbed the rebound and let drive but Beare cleared. Keeping up the ganging attack, Drummond sent another drive from the right boards that skimmed across the goalmouth.

McKay was chased for tripping and it was during his absence that Drummond finally beat Beare, Holouka and Vail assisting him. Schwab got in the clear and shot straight at Porter who cleared.

Hollinger put on another ganging attack and Kovalchuk went in fast and his drive hit the post as he crashed into the boards.

After Porter had cleared three more shots, Cecchini tried his "come out" Porter, and let me shoot it in" trick but it didn't work. McKay tried it and again Porter cleared.

Just before the bell went Beare made a fine save from Baker.

At the start of the second stanza Hollinger sent every man up, and Porter made a fine save of McKay's shot. McCoy got the disc at the blue line, and with the Greenshirts behind him, he had no trouble in beating Beare.

The Greenshirts worked like Trojans to get back into the lead, and had the Miners worried. Porter got in the way of Gordon's shot; another went across the goalmouth; and finally Delmonte found an opening when Cecchini faked a shot and sent it to Delmonte instead. Eleven seconds later as Cecchini was skating around with the puck waiting for his men to come out, he slipped and Turcotte pounced on the loose puck and skated in on Beare to put the Miners one up. Two minutes later Turcotte put the Miners further ahead with a blue line pass from Vail and Baker.

Hollinger fought back and Porter put on a great exhibition, clearing five shots in a row before the Miners were able to get out. Wink Wilson put on a burst of speed to catch McKay going in alone and skated him into the corner. McComb, who was holding down the left wing, chore, missed a fine chance, with the goal unattended, his shot going wide. Defelice shot just inches wide of the open corner. LaBarre's drive went across the goalmouth.

McCoy put the Miners in a good lead on the best goal of the night. He went down alone, flipped the puck past the defence and then barged his way between Schwab and McKay who had him stopped momentarily, picked up the puck again and scored.

In the last three minutes Porter did nothing but look at pucks coming at him from every angle.

It was only a question whether the Hollinger could overcome the big lead of the Miners, and when the bell went they were still two short, with Porter getting all three stars.

The Miners failed to capitalize when they had the one man advantage, Pontello being chased for holding; they didn't get a shot at Beare.

When Pontello returned, the Greenshirts put on the pressure and Porter had another busy time. Beare, at the other end, cleared the only two clean shots at goal the Miners fired in the period.

Gordon cut the Miners' lead after Porter saved from Cecchini. McKay got the rebound and passed to Petrucci and then over to Gordon who was uncovered. On another attack Gordon and Pontello both missed with only Porter to beat.

Wilson was chased for hooking, but the Hollingers were kept from ganging until he returned. Porter then had his busiest time of the night, stopping six while he was on his pins and others which the Hollinger failed to lift over his body when he was lying on the ice. Wink Wilson made it six, when he robbed Lallo of puck and skated in on Beare.

Hollinger put on another ganging attack when McComb was sent off for holding, and Delmonte got his second goal on a pass from Schwab.

McCoy forced Gordon to shoot wide when he got in the clear by skating him off in the last minute of the game.

Case Against George Zabo Remanded for a Week.
