

# Sudbury Frood Tigers Take First Game in N.O.H.A. Senior Finals From Porcupine All Stars

## Like Their Last Name the Sudbury Team Break Fast and Pounce on Every Misplay by the All-Stars. Vezina Stars in Nets After Porter is Hurt. Game Was Fast and Clean.

Showing much better speed and all-round defence, coupled with tricky plays, the Sudbury Tigers outplayed the Porcupine All-Stars in the first of the best-of-seven series for the N.O.H.A. championship. The score was 6-2 in a very clean game.

The Porcupine All-Stars were very slow and careless around their own goal, their passes going to a Tiger player in clearing, and the Tigers were quick to pounce on every one, and quick to shoot.

Porter played a fine game for two periods but had to retire 45 seconds after the third period started, having stopped a shot with his face. Vezina, the sub-goalie, took his place and played his best game of the season, clearing many shots that were labelled.

At the start of the game, the Tigers pressed the attack and Porter had some narrow escapes before the All-Stars broke loose.

Maki drove in a shot from the right boards, the puck going over the net off Gerth's pads.

Gerth made three quick saves of "Mickey" McKay's shot labelled for the right corner. P. Carnegie shot the rubber right back, and O. Carnegie tried to score on the rebound.

Vaillancourt went right through on Porter who cleared. MacLenahan tested Porter with a long shot.

Each goalie was visited in end-to-end rushes. O. Carnegie had tough luck when his shot hit the post, and Gerth clearing from H. Carnegie. Porter pulled off three great saves when Gee and Hastie both had him at their mercy.

Morris broke away and passed to H. Carnegie who was in the clear, but before he could get his shot away, he was turned around by MacLenahan.

# Sudbury Frood Tigers Take a Good Lead in N.O.H.A. Finals by Second Win on Monday

## Tigers Favoured to Take Series in Four Straight. Next Two Games Will be Played in Sudbury, Saturday and Monday. All Observe One Minute's Silence With Frood Team in the Death of Mr. Frank J. Eager Superintendent of Frood Mine.

The Sudbury Frood Tigers made it two in a row against the Porcupine All-Stars at the McIntyre Arena last Monday night by downing the local boys 6-2, and on the play of both games should have no trouble in taking the series in four straight.

Gerth in the nets for the Tigers was the main cog in the wheel that beat the All-Stars. The main spring of attack was Vaillancourt, whose speed and slickhanding netted three goals to put the game on ice.

For two periods Gerth was busier than a jack-rabbit, and with a certain amount of luck that goes with a goal-keeper, he saved at least half a dozen goals.

The All-Stars had all the play in the first period and had the Tigers battled up. Maki just missed the open corner. Drummond sent over a goalmouth pass but Baker was too far out to bat it in. Gee broke away fast, but his shot went wide with only Porter to beat.

Gerth cleared three shots from McKay, Drummond and Baker. Vaillancourt broke fast and went in on Porter who outgassed him.

On another attack Gerth cleared from H. Carnegie. Petrucci shot the puck right back at Gerth and H. Carnegie banged home the rebound.

The Tigers went on the attack, and before they finished, Porter made two fine saves from Gee and Vaillancourt.

The remainder of the period was mostly in the Tigers' area with every All-Star but Porter taking a shot at Gerth, but could not beat him.

The All-Stars kept up the attack at the start of the second stanza. Maki laid down a perfect goalmouth pass, but Baker failed to get his stick on it, Gee on a breakaway shot wide of the mark.

McKay drove in a bullet shot which careened over the net off H. Carnegie's stick who tried to steer it into the net. O. Carnegie hit the post right after.

The All-Stars redoubled their efforts when Blake was chased for slashing Baker. Gerth cleared six times. Gee made a fine job of rapping the puck, and was finally thumbed for clipping McKay. Blake returned at the same time.

Petrucci was sentenced for slashing, and while both teams were shorthanded MacLenahan and Vaillancourt went in on Porter. Porter stopped MacLenahan's shot. The puck laid just inches out on the open side by Vaillancourt; who tapped it in. In just over a minute later Carriere went the length of the ice; Porter saved, but before he could clear the rebound Carriere rounded the goal and banged it in.

Before the gong, Gerth dove headfirst after H. Carnegie's shot.

At the start of the third period both goalies were visited in quick succession. Maki just missed Drummond's pass. Porter beat Hastie to the punch as he was about to tap in a goalmouth pass.

Morris worked his way into the clear, and was tripped from behind by Carriere. Hobe Esseltine put on four forwards with Morris, but Gerth only had one shot on him by Morris which he grabbed and threw to the corner.

Lahti got a breakaway, and in trying to get Porter out, he went past the goal without getting his shot away.

Gerth was lucky in saving from Petrucci and McKay on two quick shots. Hastie went right in on Porter but failed to get the rubber in.

The All-Stars put on their final attack to wipe out the Tigers' one goal lead and Gerth put on a brilliant performance in clearing from Drummond, Maki and Baker, who all had tags on their shots.

Gee put the Tigers two up when he scored on Porter's pass. The puck just got between Porter's pads and the goal post.

H. Carnegie put on a fine display of stickhandling and nearly scored as he rounded the Tigers' cage, his shot hitting the post.

### RED CROSS Questions & Answers

Q. Who are included under the name "BRITISH" prisoners of war?  
A. The term "BRITISH" prisoners of war includes: all captured personnel of Army, Navy or Air Force; civilian passengers (men and women) and crews of merchant ships sunk or captured at sea; and men, women and children civilian internees — who belong to the British Empire. It includes people from the Dominions, India and the Colonies. All Canadian prisoners and internees are therefore included under the term "British" prisoners of war.

Q. Why is this important to Canadians?  
A. Because the British Red Cross Society has assumed the responsibility of supplying (a) food; (b) clothing; (c) medical comforts and drugs to all British prisoners of war; this includes our Canadian prisoners.

Q. Then why is the Canadian Red Cross sending parcels of food to British prisoners of war?  
A. Because the British Red Cross has asked the Canadian Red Cross to share this great responsibility by packing and despatching 100,000 parcels of food each week to British prisoners.

Q. What goes into a Canadian Red Cross food parcel?  
A. Here is a list of contents, which are all (except the soap) selected for their food value in proper proportions by a committee of food and nutrition experts:—16 oz. milk powder, 16oz. butter, 4 oz. cheese, 12 oz. corned beef, 10 oz. pork meat, 8 oz. salmon, 4 oz. sardines or kippers, 8 oz. raisins, 8 oz. prunes, 8 oz. sugar, 16 oz. jam, 8 oz. chocolate, 16 oz. biscuits, 1 oz. salt and pepper, 4 oz. tea, 2 oz. soap.

Q. How much does a parcel cost?  
A. The Canadian Red Cross estimates that it costs approximately \$2.50 to "lay down" each weekly food parcel in Geneva, Switzerland. This is becoming the greatest item of Red Cross expenditure, and the bill would be greater if the Red Cross had to pay for the packing of these parcels but fortunately, they are all packed by Women voluntary workers.

Q. Does not the Red Cross send cigarettes or tobacco in its parcels?  
A. No. It would delay the shipment if those articles were included. Bulk shipments of tobacco and cigarettes are made to the camps by the British Red Cross at the rate of 50 cigarettes or 2 ozs. of tobacco per week to each prisoner. Tobacco and cigarettes may also be ordered from licensed firms of tobacco dealers and sent direct by mail by any individual or organization in Canada.

Q. How do the Red Cross parcels get to the individual prisoners? Is each

parcel addressed to a prisoner?  
A. No. These food parcels are not personally addressed. They are all uniform in size and contents so that it is only necessary to see that there are enough parcels sent to each camp for each British prisoner to get one. At Geneva parcels are put on trains or trucks with an International Red Cross representative in charge, and on arrival at the prison camp, they are given over to the British prisoner chosen as "Spokesman" by his fellow prisoners. He gives a receipt to the Red Cross Committee for all parcels received and is responsible for seeing that each British prisoner, regardless of rank, gets a parcel each week — unless difficulties of transportation make this impossible.

### Dr. A. H. Harkness Noted Engineer Passes at Toronto

#### Was a Brother of Mr. A. R. Harkness, of Timmins.

Mr. A. R. Harkness, of the Marshall-Ecclestone staff, is in Toronto this week on the end duty of attending the funeral of his brother, Dr. A. H. Harkness, one of Canada's outstanding consulting engineers. Mrs. Max Whitby (formerly Miss Eleanor Harkness) now of Haliburton, but at one time on the teaching staff of the Timmins High and Vocational School, is a daughter of the late Dr. Harkness.

Dr. A. H. Harkness died suddenly on Sunday, Feb. 28th, at his home, 185 Glencairn avenue, Toronto, following a heart attack. He was 70 years of age at the time of death.

Dr. Harkness was the Senior member of the firm of Harkness and Hertzberg, consulting engineers, Toronto, and he held high place in his profession. He designed the structural work of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa, and the design of recent buildings of the Hellingier Consolidated was also his work. Among other structures for which his firm was responsible were the buildings of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, the C. P. R. building, the Western Hospital, the East Block of the Parliament Buildings at Queen's Park, and other noted Toronto buildings; the Sun Life and the Confederation Life, the two largest structures in Montreal; the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Winnipeg; and the Halifax General Hospital.

Graduating in Arts from the University of Toronto in 1897, he joined the faculty in 1901. In 1910 he opened offices of his own. In 1937 he was honoured with the degree of Doctor of Engineering. In 1935 he was awarded the Sir John Kennedy Medal, the highest honour which the Engineering Institute of Canada can bestow. He was a past vice-president of the Engineering Institute of Ontario. He was widely known also as an enthusiast in horticulture, and his success with his iris garden brought him wide fame.

He is survived by a widow and four daughters.
