The present system of government, Mr. Langdon explained was built up since Confederation, each step being made after the need for change became apparent. He believed there should be uniformity of legislation in each province respecting health, education, insurance, etc. Then only one form of government would be necessary, resulting in a great saving of cost. He thought that there were too many already on the payroll of the government, and that it would be well to avoid building up further of these bureaus. Attention was drawn to the fact that the Beveridge Report was now under review by committees of governments as well as by lay committees, and that the matter would be very much before the public mind in the near future.

Others taking part in the debate were Kiwanians Phil Laporte, E. H. King, Geo. N. Ross, Dr. Honey and Arch Gillies, and their brief but pointed remarks were illuminating and interesting.

Canada's Most Famed Flier of Present War Visits North Bay

Squadron Leader T. G. Holley, Officer Commanding No. 7, Recruiting Station R.C.A.F. North Bay, was in Timmins to-day and was very pleased at the reception given Flying Officer "Buzz" Beurling in North Bay this week. He believes the visit will be another factor in maintaining the popular interest in the Air Force and so will prove of special service in the war effort.

Flying Officer "Buzz" Beurling is one of the most famous of the number of the R.C.A.F. in this war, and is rightly hailed as a popular hero. The people of North Bay gave him a rousing reception.

Flying-Officer "Buzz" Beurling, D.S.O., D.F.C., D.F.M. and Bar, came in to North Bay from Vancouver by T.C.A. at 10 p.m. Tuesday. He was met by a Guard of Honour from No. 7 Recruiting centre, and was guest of honour at the R.C.A.F. luncheon given in connection with Air Force week. There was a street parade at 2.30 on Wednesday, the streets were lined with school children who paraded to Main Street, where they lined up in front of the adults. He was cheered and cheered as he rode along the Main Street in the parade. The parade consisted of the personnel of the R.C.A.F. Recruiting centre, Company of soldiers from Chipewewa Barracks, R.C.A.F. Band from No. 1 Initial Training School in Toronto, and the Air Cadets of No. 16 Lions Gateway Squadron, and No. 146 Scollard Hall Squadron.

Flying-Officer Beurling inspected both Cadet Squadrons and spoke briefly, telling the boys that they would have to take the places of today's flyers tomorrow, so to speak, and that they should make the most of their training, realizing what they are having handed to them on a silver platter compared to the struggle boys had to get experience hanging around airports and working as grease-monkeys.

Owing to weather conditions he was unable to leave North Bay by air as planned on Wednesday afternoon but it was expected he would be able to fly South to-day (Thursday).

There were 200 at the luncheon in his honour and it was the great climax to the many events which made up the Northern Ontario Air Force week at North Bay.

Flying-Officer Beurling was supposed to have been there Monday but due to flying conditions was unable to come till Tuesday evening, the delay having its compensations as due to the milder weather then, the band was able to play during the parade.

Among other things, Flying-Officer Beurling was taken out to see the Dionne quintuplets and had pictures taken with them.
