#### Winner of George Cross Visited in S. Porcupine

The following extract from a Toronto paper, although not concerning a real South Porcupine citizen, is interesting to note, because this first Canadian winner of the George Cross wisited here quite often in his youth. He was the son of Mr. John Hendry, who is the brother of Mr. Jim Hendry (former Town Engineer of South Porcupine, now at Geraldton) and also of Mr. George Hendry, who is an employee of the Dome Mines and lives at Dome

"London, April 3rd - Posthumous award of the George Cross to Corporal James Hendry, of Little Long Lac, Ont., killed in a mine by an explosion he attempted to prevent after helping others take cover, is announced in the London Gazette. An experienced miner and member of the Royal Canadian Engineers, Hendry was in charge of a tunnelling shift when fire broke out in a powder magazine, menacing lives and equipment. Hendry ordered civilian helpers to take cover, then obtained water in an unsuccessful attempt to put out the fire before the magazine blew up."
