Retail Merchants Holding 2nd Annual Banquet To-Night

Guest Speaker, Mr. Howard Foreman, of Ottawa, to Give Address on "Consumer Rationing"

There has been general invitation to the public to attend the second annual banquet of the Timmins Retail Merchants' Association in the main dining room of the Empire hotel this evening (Thursday, April 23rd) at 7 p.m.

The guest speaker for the occasion will be Mr. Howard Foreman, of Ottawa, administrator of non-ferrous metals in the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. The topic of his address will be "Consumer Rationing". This will be an address especially well worth hearing. Mr. Foreman is a particularly talented speaker, and he has a thorough grasp of his subject. His address will clear up a large number of questions that have been troubling many for some time.

Mr. Foreman has had a wide experience in business and in life, and his recent connection with the Wartime Prices and Trade Board gives him access to facts and figures that are not available to the ordinary man. Mr. Foreman was born in Hamilton, Ontario, and educated at the public and high schools in that city. His first position was that of office boy, but in 1922 he entered the employ of the Steel Company of Canada, serving in many departments of that company. For twenty-one years he served the Steel Company of Canada, in recent years holding executive position on the sales force. In 1941 he was loaned to the Department of Munitions and Supplies as an expert, being for a year the assistant chief of the shell division. From that position he was taken by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board and appointed administrator of fabricated steel and non-ferrous metals.

In addition to the address by Mr. Foreman, the banquet programme will be featured by a few short speeches by local business men, while there will be an excellent programme of music and other features.
