Tisdale Council Told of Help to N. O. Mining Towns

A letter from the Provincial Treasurer outlining the Northern Ontario Mining Municipal Association's discussion confirming the understanding of decisions reached with members of the Cabinet was read.

Existing legislation will not be changed but the Government has agreed to pay subsidies to insure revenues to municipalities equal to that which would have been received if proposed amendment to the Assessment Act had been enacted.

Certain assistance will be available from the mining companies to the municipalities which have been affected by war conditions, and the calculation of educational grants will follow the same practice as in recent years.

The Canadian Legion was granted permission to hold a carnival in the McIntyre Arena in June. Eyalow (section 404A of the Municipal Act) was read granting aid to Russia and establishing and maintaining a local Civilian Defence Corps.

The Cemetery Board's annual report was submitted.
