

10,233 Articles Shipped by Timmins Red Cross During Month of March

Reports Presented to Monthly Meeting of Executive of Timmins Branch. Local Red Cross May Set Up Casualty Information Relief Booth for Use in Case of Emergency.

The regular monthly executive meeting of the Timmins Branch of the Red Cross Society was held in the work-rooms in the basement of the Post Office Thursday evening, April 8. Mr. K. H. Stubbs, vice-president, presided in the absence of Mr. A. R. Harkness.

The financial statement for the month of March presented by the treasurer, Mr. H. Fuke, showed total receipts of \$17,682.82 and expenditures (for wool, clothing, hospital supplies, etc.) \$446.10, leaving a bank balance as of March 31, 1943, \$17,236.72.

It was decided to transfer \$15,000 to Canadian Red Cross headquarters in Toronto.

Mr. J. M. Douglas and Mr. K. H. Stubbs were appointed to meet with Dr. Lane to consider the matter of setting up a Casualty Information Relief Post for use in case of an emergency in Timmins.

Mrs. Penny gave a report on the Refresher course for nurses she and Miss Blais attended at the School of Nursing, University of Western Ontario. Both of these nurses feel that they derived a great deal of useful information and inspiration from this course and at the same time were pleased to note that the C.D.C. in Timmins compares favourably with the best in the province.


Mrs. W. J. McCoy, the Timmins representative at the annual meeting of the Canadian Red Cross Society in Toronto, having returned but a few hours earlier had no time to prepare a detailed report which will be presented at the next monthly executive meeting.

Mrs. McCoy visited all departments of the Red Cross work and was especially interested in the Blood Donors' Clinic and the packing of Prisoners of War parcels being done by volunteer workers. The women of Timmins will feel justifiably proud of their endeavours as Mrs. McCoy brought back word that the work of all three departments (sewing, surgical supplies and knitting) is among the best unpacked at the receiving depots.

Omega Mines the Winner of National Safety Award Trophy

Award Presented to Manager Angus D. Campbell on Monday.

Kirkland Lake, April 14—The Omega Gold Mines Ltd., of Larder Lake, has won the John T. Ryan Trophy of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy, awarded for the 1942 best safety record of any Canadian Metal Mine employing over 100 men throughout the year.

The trophy was presented at the annual dinner of the Institute at Montreal, Monday, April 12, with Omega manager, Mr. Angus D. Campbell attending to receive it. The secretary-treasurer of the company, Mr. E. D. Fox, of Toronto, will also attend as the personal representative of the president and board of directors in the unavoidable absence of the President, Mr. J. P. Bickell. The latter is president of the McIntyre-Porcupine Mines Ltd., and of the Government-controlled Victory Aircraft Ltd.

The trophies which the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy awards both in coal and metal mining, bear the name and perpetuate the memory of the late John T. Ryan, a mining engineer who pioneered mine safety and the manufacture and use of mine safety apparatus.

Each trophy is a statuette of a miner returning home safely from work to his children. The base is suitably inscribed and the names of the yearly winners are to be engraved on it.

The coal trophy, now awarded for the first time was won by the Dominion Coal Company's No. 25 Mine in Nova Scotia and the metal trophy, now awarded for the second year goes to Omega.

The awards are based on the frequency of compensation accidents (over six days' lost time) per 1000 men employed.

Omega, which has always had a good safety record, surpassed all Canadian mines, both coal and metal, in 1942, with only one compensation accident, for an average of 210 men at work (300 shifts per year). This gave Omega a frequency of less than five compensation accidents per 1000 men, which so far as known is an all-time Canadian safe mining record. Over 15 months have now passed at the mine without a compensation accident.

Plans are underway to fittingly receive the John T. Ryan Trophy at Omega by a mine party of employees, wives and guests to be held in the Capital Theatre in Larder Lake on the evening of April 18th.

At this party, individual safety awards will be made to 50 employees who have worked for over five years without a day's lost time from accident. The entertainment program for the event will feature Miss Gray Creighton's Girls from Kirkland Lake, and Mr. Jack Reid at the piano.

More Wartime Prices and Trade Board Cases Before Court

Grocery Firm Fined a Total of \$500.00 and Costs on Two Charges. Other Charges Withdrawn.

At Timmins police court on Tuesday the Blahley firm, with stores in Timmins and Schumacher, was fined a total of \$500.00 and costs on two charges, one of failing to observe the price ceiling regulations in regard to the sale of milk and the other in regard to butter. S. C. Platus, K. C., appeared for the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, and explained to the court that the Blahley firm had sold milk at a price higher than was just and reasonable, and that the same held in regard to butter sold by the firm. Mr. Platus explained that the government had given a subsidy to milk producers to keep down the price of milk. The firm must have known this and should have reduced prices to meet the regulations. In the case of butter it had been found that several sales had been made at an increase of a couple of cents per pound over the level set by law. He suggested that the offence was a serious one as that sort of thing threatened the whole price structure. He thought a substantial penalty should be imposed in these two cases.

J. A. Cousineau, counsel for Mrs. Blahley, pointed out that there were so many regulations that it was difficult for anyone to keep track of them. There was a big chance for honest mistakes to be made. That the firm was not after undue profits was shown by the fact that butter had been sold by the store two cents a pound cheaper than the ceiling price, the customers getting the benefit of this. It appeared that the chief trouble had been the fact that the offences charged had occurred around the Christmas season when the clerks not fully acquainted with the many regulations had to be engaged to handle the rush. He asked that in view of all the facts of the case only a minimum fine be imposed in each case.
