Tenders will be received by the undersigned, up to 5 p.m. on Monday, May 10th, for the collection of garbage in the Township of Whitney, for the year ending May 19th, 1944, for the following areas:

Plan M-8, M-12, M-13, M-16, M-17, M-18, M-21, M-25, M-27, M-32, M-36, M-48, M-54, M-67, M-83, Laine Township, Jarvi Township and Building on Porcupine Lake Mine Property.

Applicant must be prepared to furnish all containers, said containers to hold liquid in summer, but boxes may be used during winter months. Collection to be made on a certain day each week for each district, and a record to be kept of all places cleared.

All garbage to be burned at the Dump, and Dump to be kept in order. Contents of Chemical closets must be put in containers by owners, and all paper must be baled.

All garbage must be collected when in containers, and all toilets cleared, as covered by specifications in Township By-law. Ashes containing water will not be collected.

All new dwellings to be cleared without extra charge. During summer months, garbage and toilets to be cleared during early hours of the morning.

Snow to be shovelled by residents, and paths to be cleared for collector, on the day collection to be made.

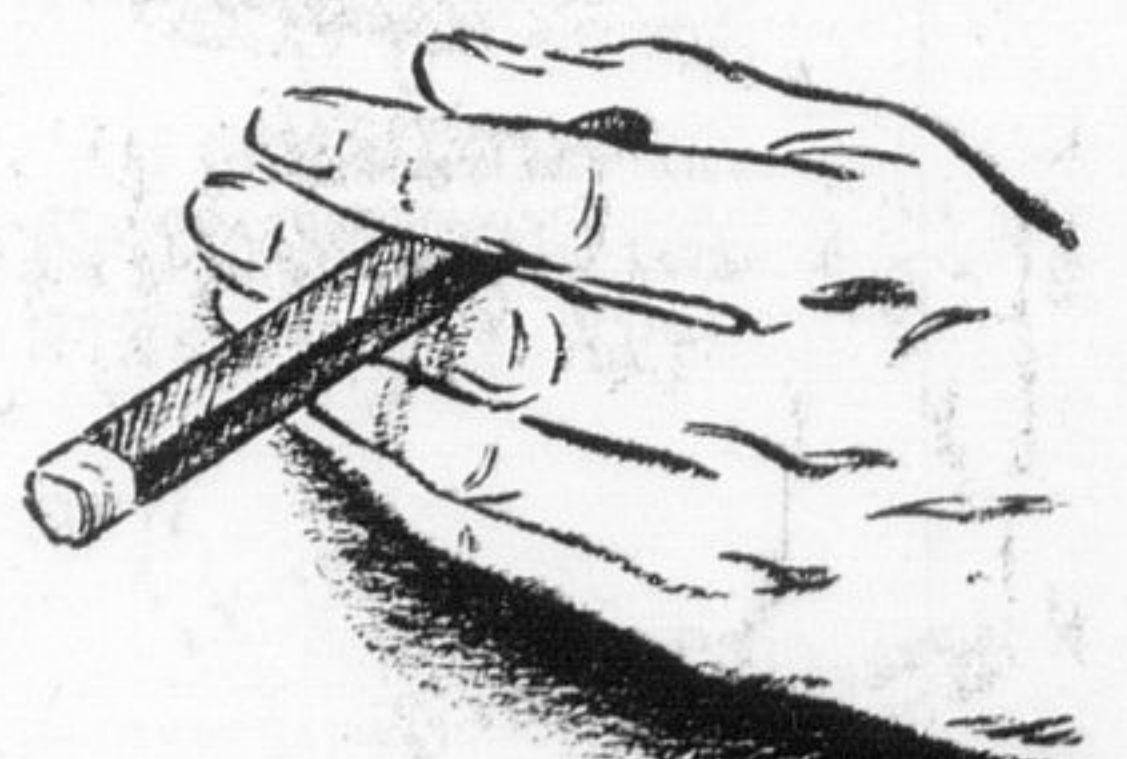
