This is proven not only from the large number of cards and letters of thanks being received from the men overseas, but also by the words of gratitude in all of the letters. As one soldier phrased it, "Good Canadian cigarettes are always a real treat." Another points out that the cigarettes are a valuable factor in keeping up the morale of the men overseas. NEW BOX CAR GETS FIRST WAR LOAD



This is one of 2,000 new box cars built for the Canadian National Railway to handle the increasing volume of war traffic over the line. The National System, in operation at the plant of National Tailwax Mouldings Limited being loaded with naval guns manufactured at this subsidiary of the Canadian National Railway. The car bears the new maple leaf design with the System slogan. The big crane handling the gun being placed in the car is operated by Noella Baudet. Just in close-up of Miss Baudet operating the crane. There are seven girls working as crane operators in this big war plant. The box in which the naval gun barrel is encased for travel is a special product of the Canadian National Railways Montreal wood mill shop. The box is of unusual design with intricate bracing to hold the barrel firmly in place, while on the exterior steel pieces strengthen the carrier and provide loops to enable crane hooks to take hold when transferring to and from the freight cars at terminals.

Old-Time Resident of Timmins Dies at Hospital Sunday

Charles Barnard One Time Member of Timmins Fire Department, but More Recently of Public Works Dept.

Funeral services were conducted at Walker's Funeral Chapel on Tuesday, May 11th, for the late Charles Barnard, who died on Sunday, May 9th, at St. Mary's hospital. The late Mr. Barnard had been ill periodically for the past two years and at the time of his death was 71 years of age. Rev. W. M. Mustard conducted the service.

Palbearers at the funeral were six firemen, Messrs. M. Daher, J. McKinnon, F. Culhane, A. Ayotte, J. Martin, and W. Stanley.

The deceased had been a resident of town for the past 25 years, his former home being at Renfrew, Ont. He was an old member of the fire brigade, where he was employed for about 10 years, and then had been transferred to the Public Works Department. There he was employed, acting in the capacity of nightwatchman for several years past.

The late Mr. Barnard had many friends here, especially among the old-timers, for he was a genial friendly man, honest and honourable, and always with a cheery word. He worked in the lumber camps in the early days of the North, and also for a time had a farm in the Connaught area. For several years he was a popular member of the Timmins fire brigade acting as driver of the fire team in the days before the horses were replaced by electrical

Annual Spring Clean-up Ordered in Tisdale Tp.

Notice has been given by the Township Board of Health for all householders to have the annual spring clean-up. To eliminate as far as possible the breeding places of flies—manure heaps, and open garbage cans are to be supplied with periodic applications of chlorides of lime which may be secured from the Township garage.

Instructions for keeping down health menaces are given briefly. Wrap garbage before placing in container. Keep cans in suitable places, preventing dogs from upsetting them and keep them covered.

The keeping of chickens with the town limits can be a serious nuisance unless the pens and runs are kept clean and no manure is allowed to accumulate. If these measures are carried out with some thought, the results will be apparent to all.
