New Canadian Talent Presented at Monteith for the Veteran Guards

During the programme, the Croatian Orchestra played several selections, those including the "Lenin March," the "Croatian Concert Waltz," "Spanish Fantasia," a selection of Russian songs, selection of Croatian dance numbers, "Sailors march," all enjoyable numbers that were heartily encored. In brightly-coloured costumes, Misses Mary Stefanich and Annie Barliko, did the Ukrainian dance, which was heartily enjoyed.

A group of Ukrainian girls, danced the "Kalinka," a dance of their native land, and a very good number.

The concluding and one of the most enjoyable numbers of all, was the Russian Cossack Dance by Gunner Mike Kuinka and Mrs. Anne Kuinka, both dressed in the traditional costumes. They were received with thunderous applause, and encored many times at the conclusion of their number.
