South Porcupine, May 19—(Special to The Advance)—The following letter posted on April 1st from British West Africa explains itself. It is of sufficient interest to the Porcupine Camp to be published here.

It is from Flying Officer E. J. Thornton, formerly employed at Pamour, and was received by the Eastern Porcupine Red Cross in acknowledgment of his Christmas parcel.

"Dear Ladies:—Received your Christmas parcel two days ago. I must apologize for the mail service to this Coast it usually takes a letter or parcel from two to five months to reach me from Canada.

Although it was late for December 25th we have had a miniature Christmas all to ourselves as most of the ladies Christmas parcels to this Coast have just arrived.

I thank you for the grand parcel and all the good wishes that come with it. Everything was in good shape considering the length of time it took to reach West Africa. It's another victory by the British fleet and Coastal Command under the German U-boats.

The war situation seems to be improving every day. But I'm afraid we still have a long hard road ahead of us before the final victory.

You will never realize how much your parcels and kind wishes help up along that road.

But it goes a long way towards keeping up the boys' morale, just knowing that someone back home is with them in spirit eases many a burden and will help more towards that final victory than you ever will be credited with.
