

A quarter of a century ago some Canadian soldiers who had lost their sight in the First World War came back to Canada. As a result, The Canadian National Institute for the Blind was founded, and, for the first time in Canadian History, there is a Dominionwide organization devoted to the interests of the adult blind, and to champion their cause.

Now, twenty-five years later, a new generation of Canadian soldiers is in the world's battle-line. A few of them have already been blinded.
