## Flying Officer E. Leclaire Dies on Service Overseas

Sudbury, June 16th—Following operations over enemy territory, Flying Officer Eugene Leclaire, formerly of Sudbury, has been listed as killed in action. He was the son of William Leclaire, now a resident of Timmins.

Born in Sudbury 27 years ago, F. O. Leclaire attended St. Aloysius Separate School and the Sudbury Mining and Technical School. After graduating from Tech as an electrical engineer, he left to take a position with the Lake Geneva Lead and Zinc Mining Company near Cartier. A short time later he went to Geraldton where he was employed for three years up to the time of his enlistment in the R.C.A.F. at Toronto in September of 1940.

After taking his basic training course at Toronto he was posted to Brandon where he received his wings and his pilot officer's commission. Shortly before going overseas four months ago, he was promoted to the rank of flying officer. He served as an instructor before going overseas.

During his school days, F. O. Leclaire was prominent in athletics. He was a standout sprinter and pole-vaulter as well as a member of the Church of Christ the King badminton team. He was also a member of the young people's association at the church.

In addition to his father, William Leclaire, of Timmins, F. O. Leclaire is survived by a brother, W. E. Leclaire, of Montreal and six sisters, Mrs. A. Webster, of Bloor St. Sudbury; Mrs. A. C. Smith, of Minnow Lake; Mrs. P. E. Healey, of Sault Ste. Marie; Mrs. W. E. Hawden, of Port Arthur; Mrs. Stuart Ferguson, of St. Catharines, and Mrs. E. M. Ainslie, of Winona, Ont.

## Sudbury Also Flooded by Fierce Rains This Week

## Heavy Damage Done by Storm in the North Bay Area

T. & N. O. Station at Widdfield Destroyed by Fire.

Considerable damage was done in the North Bay area on Monday of this week. Chippewa Creek flooded considerable land when swollen by the recent rains. At North Bay a truck from Kirkland Lake containing furniture was overturned in the road on account of the floods and blocked the street for several hours. Electrical disturbances affected telephones and telegraph lines in the city and district. Various buildings in the city were flooded.

Believed to have been struck by a lightning bolt, the T. & N. O. station building at Widdfield, about 16 miles north of North Bay, was totally destroyed by fire at about 6 o'clock Tuesday morning. T. & N. O. railway officials at North Bay announced today. The station building itself was razed to the ground, although connecting buildings are apparently unharmed.

Victory gardens in the city and district suffered seriously from the rainstorms and floods. Several road washouts were reported from city and district.

## Speaker of Legislature Holds Unpopular Opinion

There was quite a flurry in political circles this week at the report that Hon. James H. Clark, K.C., Speaker of the Ontario Legislature, had told a United States audience that forty to forty-five per cent. of the people of Canada favoured political union with the United States. The charitable view to take was that this man paid by the British people of Canada had been misquoted or misunderstood, or at the very worst that he was not favouring such a move. On Monday, however, Speaker Clark defended his theory and added that this being a democracy, where a man can still express an opinion. Of course, under the British flag a man has the liberty of expressing such an opinion, so long as he does not advocate the change by the use of force or the threat of force. Of course, on the other hand other people have the right to their opinion also, one of which is loyalty and affection for the British connection. People, under their democratic rights and duties, will know how to vote in connection with those who express opinions contrary to British connection. If the party that appointed him as Speaker of the House does not disassociate itself from the opinions thus expressed, the people will have the democratic right and duty to throw that party out on its left ear.

## Hundred Gold Mills Idle in Canada at Recent Time

On the authority of The Northern Miner, always reliable in its information, there are 100 idle gold mills in Canada today. Production of gold is down \$65,000,000 in three years. The 1942 production will do well to reach \$140,000,000. Gold mines are rapidly chawing up their ore reserves, while at the same time reducing milling rates.
