Although tonnage treated by Ontario gold mines increased by 1.22% in the month of May, production value decreased by 2.71%, according to the gold bulletin issued by the Ontario Department of Mines. The Month of May saw the return to production of Young-Davidson which had closed down in February. Daily average figures indicate a further downward trend and a new low in production value since October 1936. During the month of May the industry milled 725,313 tons of ore from which was recovered 179,863 ounces of gold, 30,057 ounces of silver. valued at6,936,545. This against 693,483 tons of ore, 179,168 ounces of gold, 20,282 ounces of silver, valued at \$6,899,513 for the preceding month. Average grade of ore treated by the gold mills was \$9.56 in May against \$9.94 during April. Daily average figures were, 27,397 tons milled, gold recovered 5,802 ounces, valued at \$223,760 for the month of May. Comparable figures for April were 23,116 tons milled, gold recovered 5,972 ounces, and value \$229,983.
