Tisdale Asking Amendments to the Municipal Act

Suggest Clarification of Certain Sections of Act.

South Porcupine, July 14th. Special to The Advance.
At a regular Council meeting held on Monday the following resolutions were recorded:—

"Whereas section 70 of the Municipal Act is not clear as to whether or not a candidate who has qualified can thereafter resign, or whether a candidate who has resigned can thereafter withdraw his resignation and qualify.

"And whereas a candidate who has qualified may wish to resign in order to facilitate an acclamation, thereby obviating the necessity and expense of an election.

"Now therefore be it resolved that Section 70 of The Municipal Act be amended by adding thereto subsection 7 (A) to read as follows:—70 (7) (A) "Any candidate who has qualified by filing the declaration herein before referred to may resign by delivering to the clerk within the time specified in subsection (2) a resignation in writing signed by him and attested by a witness, and such resignation shall be irrevocable."

Also:— "Whereas Sections 64 and 65 of The Municipal Act indicate that only electors have the right to attend nomination meetings.

"And whereas there is no mandatory provision excluding from such meetings other than electors.

"And whereas in fact persons other than electors do attend nomination meetings and do sign nomination papers either as proposer or seconder.

"And whereas Section 69 of the Municipal Act does not state whether or not the Returning Officer should accept or reject a nomination paper so signed.

"Now therefore be it resolved that Section 69 subsection (1) of the Municipal Act be amended by adding after the word seconder in the 5th line the words "both of whom shall be electors and" so that the said subsection shall read as follows:—69 (1) "At all nomination meetings the candidates for each office shall be proposed and seconded serially and every nomination shall be in writing, shall state the name, residence and occupation of the candidate, and shall be signed by his proposer and seconder, both of whom shall be electors and both of whom shall be present and filed with the Returning Officer within one hour from the time fixed for holding the meeting."

Those resolutions are to be sent to the Ontario Municipal Association.
