



WITH THE BOY SCOUTS

Camping Highlight of Present Activities

Camping, the event that is looked forward to by all true Scouts everywhere for weeks and months throughout the winter and spring, the time when Scouting dreams of the year come true, the feature of Scouting that serves to bring the boys even closer as true Brothers, when work, play, meals, sports, swimming, pioneering, exploring and a myriad of other activities are enjoyed by and participated in by all, is now being enjoyed by three Troops of Scouts, and will come to all others within the next two or three weeks. On Monday morning Scouts of the Third, Fourth and Eighth Troops gathered together their equipment and set out for a period of fun that cannot be excelled. The weather man is being very kind to the boys, and we hope that he will continue to smile upon them throughout their camp.

The Fourth and Eighth Troops are now under canvas at Rice Lake, below Connaught, and will taste the thrills of outdoor life all week. The camp is under the supervision of Scoutmaster Bouchard and Father Brouillard, and a very fine programme of activities has been prepared for the Scouts. Swimming facilities are excellent, those who are qualified and competent will be able to enjoy boating, non-swimmers will be given an opportunity to master the art, and a day of field and water sports will mark the visit of parents to the camp. A number of pioneering projects have also been arranged for and the Scouts should increase their competence along third line. The majority of the boys have not been in a regular Scout camp before, and for them there will be the thrill of learning to cook a complete meal, and the varied menu promises that considerable experience will be gained in the culinary art. The Patrols will do their own cooking, with each Scout taking his turn as chief cook for the day. These Troops will be out for a week only, but on returning to town Saturday every member will have many happy memories to carry him over the winter until next camping season, and each Scout will be better prepared to carry out and appreciate the fun of Scouting at its best.

The Third Troop are holding their camp at a lake in the vicinity of Barber's Bay, and they are quite proud of the fact that they have found a place that measures up to anything in the area for pleasure, comfort and convenience. There is a very fine bathing beach of sand, and lots of room for the younger Scouts to learn to swim without any danger to themselves. There is also a place where the swimmers can disport themselves to the best of their ability with lots of room to spare.

Two features of the camp stood out in the minds of every boy on leaving for their site, the first being an opportunity to christen the boats which the boys conscripted during the winter, and the second being the "Commando Day" which Scouters Father Callaghan, Milton and France have planned for the boys. The boats have been the object of much diligence for many weeks, and we are sure that they will prove their value long before the camp is over. The "Commando Day" will be something new to the boys, but an event which appeals keenly to their adventurous spirits. Every member on this day will start out from camp in the morning with his rations and a knife, no other equipment, and travelling by means of maps and compass will work towards a objective known as "Point X". Meals will be cooked on the trail, and each Patrol will strive to reach the objective without giving away their whereabouts to the other Patrols. It will require much bush knowledge, stalking, tracking, and all-round ability to accomplish their mission, but each Patrol is confident that they will succeed in their attempts. Time alone will tell the results, which are anxiously awaited by many interested friends of the Scouts.

Visitors Day for the Third Troop will be Sunday, July 1, and quite a number of parents and friends are expected to make the trip to see the boys in all their glory. The camp will run until July 24, but we know the time will be all too short for those taking part.

Fats Collection To Be Made on July 24

The next collection of the fats salvage will be made by Scouts and Cubs throughout town on July 24. As reported last week more Cubs will be taking part in the canvass due to the large numbers of Scouts working and out of town. The Cubs have demonstrated in the past their ability in activities of this nature, and good results are expected from the drive. Housewives are again asked to save and give the boys all their waste fats, which find their way directly to Canada's war industries. Officials of the committee in charge of this wartime activity are well pleased with the results that have been attained to date, but wish to point out that efforts must be continually put forth to increase the amounts that are being salvaged. Every ounce counts since every house in town is canvassed, so if what you have been able to save is only a small amount, please turn it over to the boys when they call at your door. They will be looking for your co-operation.

1st, 2nd, 6th, 7th and 9th Troops' Camp Opens July 26
Scouts of the First, Second, Sixth, Seventh and Ninth Timmins Troops will be leaving for their annual camp

on Monday July 26. Due to the difficulty encountered by some of the leaders in arranging to get away from their local activities plans for this camp have been only recently been completed. The camp will be under the leadership of Scouters Greene and Morgan, and a total of nearly forty boys will be in attendance. The site chosen for the adventure is in the vicinity of Wawatam Falls, and here, as with the other campsites, excellent facilities are to be found. Safe bathing is assured everywhere, with a good beach as an added attraction. Transportation to the site has been arranged and the boys are looking forward to the trip up the river by boat. Plans for a plentiful supply of fresh food from Timmins, including fresh milk daily, are being completed and will add much to the value of the camp. Special events which will appeal to every red-blooded boy are being planned, and while not too much is being said about them in advance, we can say that some real fishing will be offered those who are followers of that sport. The area of the campsite will be new to most of the boys, and exploring it will be another attraction offered those attending. Scouters of the Troops taking part are helping the Scouts get their equipment together, and as the camp will be on the Patrol system in every respect ample opportunity will be offered for the different Troops to follow through with their own particular interests and ambitions. Some of the Troops are determined to bring home some First Class Scouts in every respect, and all will profit immeasurably from the experience gained.

Monster Field Event Being Prepared

The big field event for Scout and Cubs, which was announced some weeks ago, is another point of particular interest in all Packs and Troops at the present time. The date of the meeting will be September 6, Labor Day, and the site one which will allow each participant to attain the best results from his efforts. Activities will commence at 1 p.m., and the programme promises lots of action. In all nineteen events are scheduled, and to complete them all it will be necessary to have several being run simultaneously. The Scout events are knot-tying relay, signalling relay, first aid relay, rescue race, tree-felling, cross-cut sawing, fire-lighting, tent-pitching, bridge-building and message relay. For the Cubs the events will be a leap-frog relay, book-balancing, ball-throwing, trains and tunnels, hopping, elbow-carrying, throwing ball through legs, skipping and message relay. In addition to the above, the following track and field events will also be staged: races—50, 75, 100, 220, 440 yds., and relays of 200, 300 and 400 yards. Running high jump, running broad jump, softball pitching, 8 and 12-lb. shot put, potato bag race, dressing race and pony express race. Cubs will be divided into two groups, junior and senior, while the Scouts will be classed as junior, intermediate and senior. A number of events for leaders are also planned, and a mystery event will give every Cub and Scout something to guess about. Full information as to the details of the events and qualifications required have been sent out to Cubmasters and Scoutmasters of every Pack and Troop, and many practice sessions will be held before the big day arrives. The committee in charge is made up of members of the Scouters Club, under the chairmanship of Scoutmaster Lucianio, and any further information required may be received from the committee. Worthwhile trophies are being arranged and every boy will want to take part in the events in his particular class.

We have been informed that due to the pressure being experienced at the present time by Dominion Headquarters of the Civilian Aircraft Detection Corps appointments will be delayed for a week or two of the Scouts who volunteered for service at the meeting held two weeks ago in the Hollinger Hall. There are still a number of the Scouts who were previously appointed who have not received their official fliers, and these boys are asked to pick them up as soon as possible from Deputy Fire Chief Morton. Others will be notified as soon as their appointments come through.

While we know that every one of you is particularly busy at this time with camping and other major activities, may we remind you to keep a watchful eye on your victory garden. A recent visit to the Dalton Farm showed that the lots had made a nice recovery from the wet spell experienced recently, and that now would be a good time to get the dust or rust off the hoe again.

Proficiency Badges are still being awarded Scouts of all Troops, and the keen interest evident since the first of the year is continuing. Six Scouts of the Fifth Troop, P. Lucianio, E. Didone, S. Holson, H. Crocco, R. Robinson, and P. Marson, have all passed their Bookbinder's Badges under the supervision of the official examiner, Mr. J. V. McClung. Ted Taylor and Al McInnis of the Seventh are now qualified Basketworkers, while R. Carboneau and Paul Cote of the Eighth Troop have passed the Laundryman and Handyman Badges respectively. Nice going, fellows.

We hope to be able to visit one or two of the local camps before next week's column, so may have some more interesting news on them for you. Good Scouting.

Power Turned on for Working of the Kam-Kotia Mines

Chief Item of Interest in
Quarterly Report of Power Company.

Probably the most interesting item in the regular quarterly statement sent to shareholders by the Canada Northern Power Corporation, Limited, is the paragraph reading:—
"Power has been turned on at the workings of Kam-Kotia Porcupine Mines, at which the Hollinger Consolidated Mines are proceeding with the production of copper."

The quarterly statement, for the quarter ending June 30th, is sent out to shareholders with the dividend cheques. It is signed by B. V. Harrison, vice-president and general manager, and reads, in part, as follows:—

"There has been but little change during the past quarter in conditions at the gold mines in the territory served by the Company. Difficulties with respect to the maintenance of the supply of labor and materials required for the war effort continue to furnish the major problems to be met by the mine operators. These should be considerably relieved when the end of the war is in sight.

"In the meantime, production of essential war metals is being accelerated, particularly by completion of the transmission line to serve the property of Indian Molybdenum Limited in Preissac Township, Northern Quebec, at which the production of Molybdenum will be commenced in the near future.
"Power has been turned on at the workings of Kam-Kotia Porcupine Mines, at which Hollinger Consolidated Mines are proceeding with the production of copper.

Additional equipment has been installed at the property of Golden Mantou Mines in Bourlaimaque Township Quebec, resulting in a substantial increase in power demand of three hundred horsepower. This property is making regular shipments of zinc concentrates."
