Sappers and Pioneers Build North Africa Advanced Dromes in Record Time



An advanced British aerodrome built for the Allied Air Forces by men of the Royal Engineers and Pioneers. The runway has a covering of Coir matting on top of which a Somerfeld track is laid. This is composed of metal rods about nine inches apart, spaced by wire netting. The matting and track give stability in wet weather so that an aircraft can land without getting bogged. On either side of the runways another piece of land is prepared for damaged aircraft to make forced landings. This is not covered with Coir matting or Somerfeld Track, as a forced landing would mean the re-laying of the runway. The Officer Commanding the operation was Major J. D. George. These dromes bring front line planes within easier striking distance of enemy occupied territory. Picture shows: a Spitfire, the first plane to use the new run-way, warming up.

Death on Monday of Mrs. John Fell, Sr. of the Dome Mines

Oldest Resident at the Dome. Was Highly Respected by All.

South Porcupine, Aug. 18.—(Special to The Advance)—It is with deep regret and sorrow that we record the passing of Mrs. John Fell of the Dome Mines at 6:10 p.m. on Monday, August 16th, at the age of 72.

She died after a short illness in Porcupine General Hospital. She had been in hospital for a short time with an illness that was not considered very serious, and was contemplating going home, as she was progressing well, when the end came quite suddenly.

With her death, another link with the past is broken, and she will be very much missed in the community more particularly at the Dome, where she has lived since 1913, and is the oldest resident.

Although of a retiring disposition she has, during her thirty years here, made herself beloved by all who knew her. With her husband, the late John Fell, who died on May 23rd, 1940, she has been interested in all good works for the community. Literally she has worked unceasingly for the Red Cross, and was an active and interested member of the Order of Eastern Star.

Mrs. Fell (born Henrietta Smith) was born in Lanarkshire, Scotland, in 1871, and was married to John Fell there before coming to Canada. In 1909 they came to Canada with their three sons. It was in 1911 that Mr. Fell came north to a position in the Dome Machine Shop, and Mrs. Fell and family followed in 1913.

The eldest son, Tom, is now on war work in Quebec; John (with whom his mother has been living since Mr. Fell's death) is machine shop foreman at the Dome Mines, and Jim, who also works at the Dome, lives in town. The latter's three little daughters are the only grandchildren.

Mrs. Fell leaves two sisters in Scotland and one brother, Mr. Alec Smith, in Toronto. A niece, Mrs. Percy Andrews, resides at the Dome.

The body will be taken from Hunkins' Funeral Parlors at 6 p.m. tonight (Wednesday) to her home at the Dome where it will rest until Thursday afternoon when a service will be held in the United Church at 2.30.

Both Archdeacon Woodall and Rev. J. C. Thompson will conduct the service and interment will take place in Tisdale Cemetery.

2 c. flour
4 tsp. Magic Baking Powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 lbs. shortening
1 egg
3/4 c. milk
5 hard boiled eggs
4 tbs. milk
2 tsp. lemon juice
3 tsp. chopped onion
2 tbs. chopped parsley
2 tbs. chopped green pepper
1 tsp. dry mustard
Salt, pepper, paprika
Sift together first 3 ingredients. Cut in shortening. Beat egg in measuring cup; add milk to make 3/4 cup; add to first mixture. Roll out 1/4 inch thick, on floured board. Chop hard boiled eggs, mix with remaining ingredients, spread on dough. Roll up like jelly roll and bake in hot oven (425° F.) 30 minutes. Serve with cheese sauce.
