

Sappers and Pioneers Build North Africa Advanced Dromes in Record Time



An advanced British aerodrome built for the Allied Air Forces by men of the Royal Engineers and Pioneers. The runway has a covering of Coir matting on top of which a Somerfeld track is laid. This is composed of metal rods about nine inches apart, spaced by wire netting. The matting and track give stability in wet weather so that an aircraft can land without getting bogged. On either side of the runways another piece of land is prepared for damaged aircraft to make forced landings. This is not covered with Coir matting or Somerfeld Track, as a forced landing would mean the re-laying of the runway.

The Officer Commanding the operation was Major J. D. George. These dromes bring front line planes within easier striking distance of enemy occupied territory. Picture shows: a Spitfire, the first plane to use the new run-way, warming up.

Interesting Address on Czecho-Slovakia at South Porcupine

Miss L. Mayowna the Guest Speaker at South Porcupine Kiwanis.

The guest speaker at the Kiwanis weekly dinner meeting on Monday was Miss Louisa Mayowna, United Church, Deaconess, who spoke on her native Czecho-Slovakia. It proved to be a wonderfully enlightening address as Miss Mayowna spoke of facts known personally, and used no notes.

She was born in Austria and lived later in Czecho-Slovakia. She has been a registered nurse for 10 years; six years of which were spent in Hamilton before she came to Timmins. She has also lived in the United States.

In her talk on Czecho-Slovakia-in the heart of Europe-she quoted that its 45,000 square miles are not occupied territory-with a population of 16 million people. The country is largely agricultural, growing sugar-beets and

The Germans came into the mountainous country for the minerals. If little is heard of the best of the country she deems this all propaganda. There always have been clever people in the country, but it has always been

Beat egg in measuring cup; add milk to make ¾ cup; add to first mixture. Roll out ¼ inch thick, on floured board. Chop hard boiled eggs, mix with remaining ingredients, spread on dough. Roll up like jelly roll and bake in hot oven (425° F.) 30 minutes. Serve with cheese sauce.
