

## Allied Forces Drive Last Enemy from Sicily

Tuesday night word came to Canada that Sicily had been completely taken over by the Allied Nations. After a violent resistence in the North the Nazi forces apparently turned all their attention to getting away, boats plying steadily between Sicily and the Italian mainland. Monday night saw practically no resistance except for 15-inch shells tossed into Messina from the beaches across the Messina straits.
