## Grandstand at the McIntyre Park Damaged by Fire

Believed to Have Been of Incendiary Origin.

Three o'clock on Wednesday morning the Schumacher fire brigade had a call to the McIntyre ball park where fire was under way at the big grandstand. Although the firemen made their usual speedy response, half of the structure had been burned before the firefighters reached the scene. It is believed that the fire was of incendiary origin. The grip the fire secured in a short time seems to support the idea of incendiarism. Also, there did not seem to be any other probable cause for the fire as it was. The watchman at the park was over on the beaches when he saw a car leave the park. Later, flames shot up from the grandstand. Some are inclined to discount the idea of incendiary fire as there does not appear to be any reason to start such a fire. On the other hand the idea is the only one that seems to fit all the facts, particularly the way the greater part of the grandstand appeared to be ablaze all at the same time. The Schumacher fire brigade did some fine fire-fighting and in a short time had the blaze under control.

While the fire was in progress the smoke and flame could be clearly seen from Fourth Avenue, Timmins, and also from some other parts of this town.

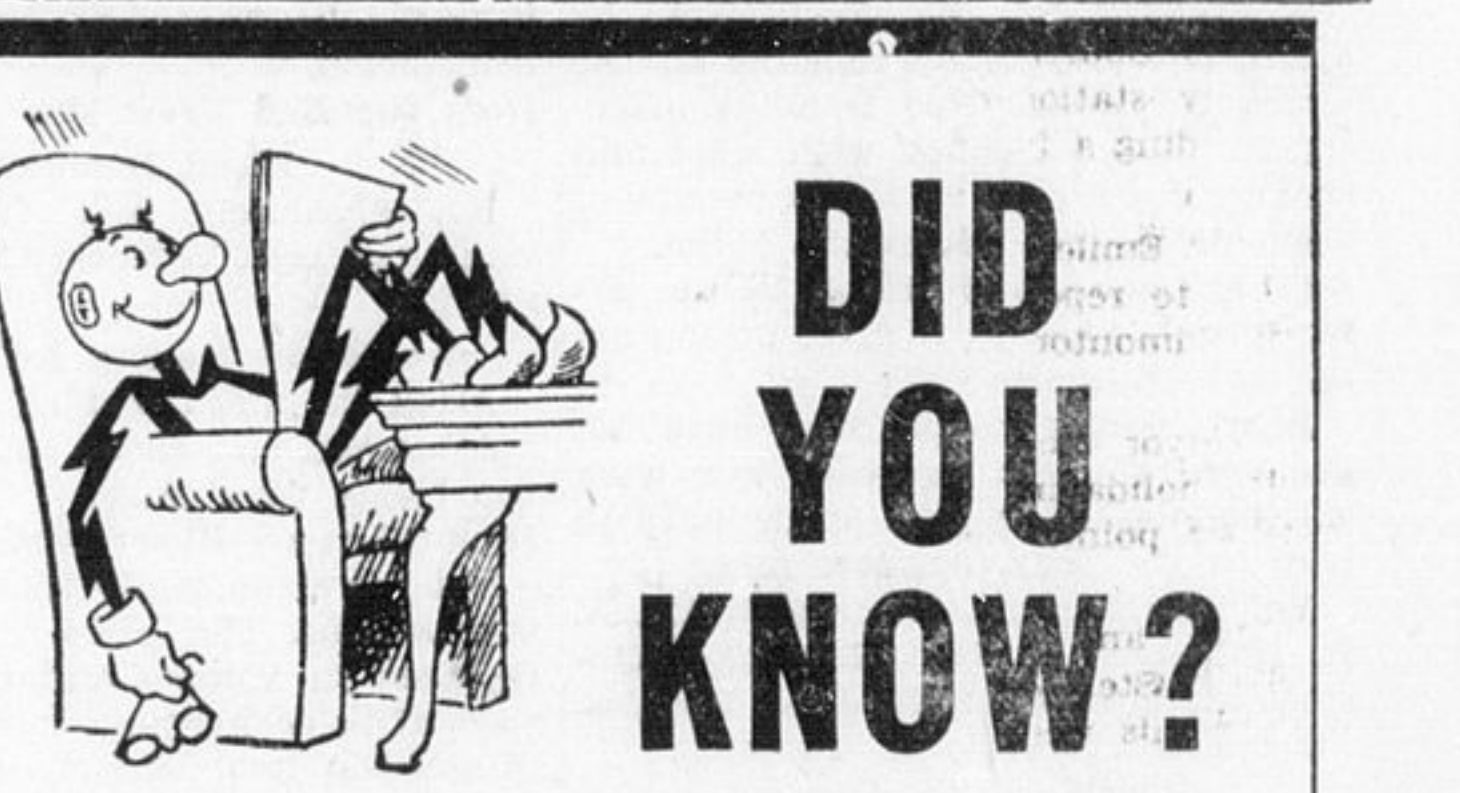

Restrictions in travelling facilities are keeping folks more at home. The timely suggestions below will help you to have better light in your home with a minimum of trouble or expense.

## 6 WARTIME LIGHTING SUGGESTIONS

1. CLEAN LAMP BOWLS and lamp bulbs frequently. You'll get 25% to 30% more light from the lamps you have.
2. USE WHITE SHADES or shades with white linings. Repaint them or reline them if necessary. Dark shades waste light.
3. SIT CLOSE ENOUGH to the lamp to get all the help it can give your eyes. A difference of a few inches may mean 50% less light.
4. AVOID DIRECT GLARE from lamp bulbs or bowl, by using shades that are deep enough and big enough.
5. ARRANGE LAMPS and furniture so each lamp can serve two or more people, if possible.
6. PLACE EACH LAMP so it puts no glare in the eyes of persons using it.
