Magistrate Warns Speeders Will Lose Licenses

At police court Tuesday Magistrate Atkinson commented on the number of cases of speeding over forty miles per hour, many of them young fellows just rushing around in cars. He intended to stop this and gave due warning that hereafter those convicted would also have their driving licenses suspended, the length of suspension to be decided in each particular case.

Defective brakes cost one motorist \$10 and costs; defective lights meant a fine of \$5 and costs; a case of speeding brought a fine of \$15 and costs. Failing to stop at stop street and illegal parking each drew \$1 and costs. A speeder paid \$15 and costs.

A dog at large was \$1 and costs.

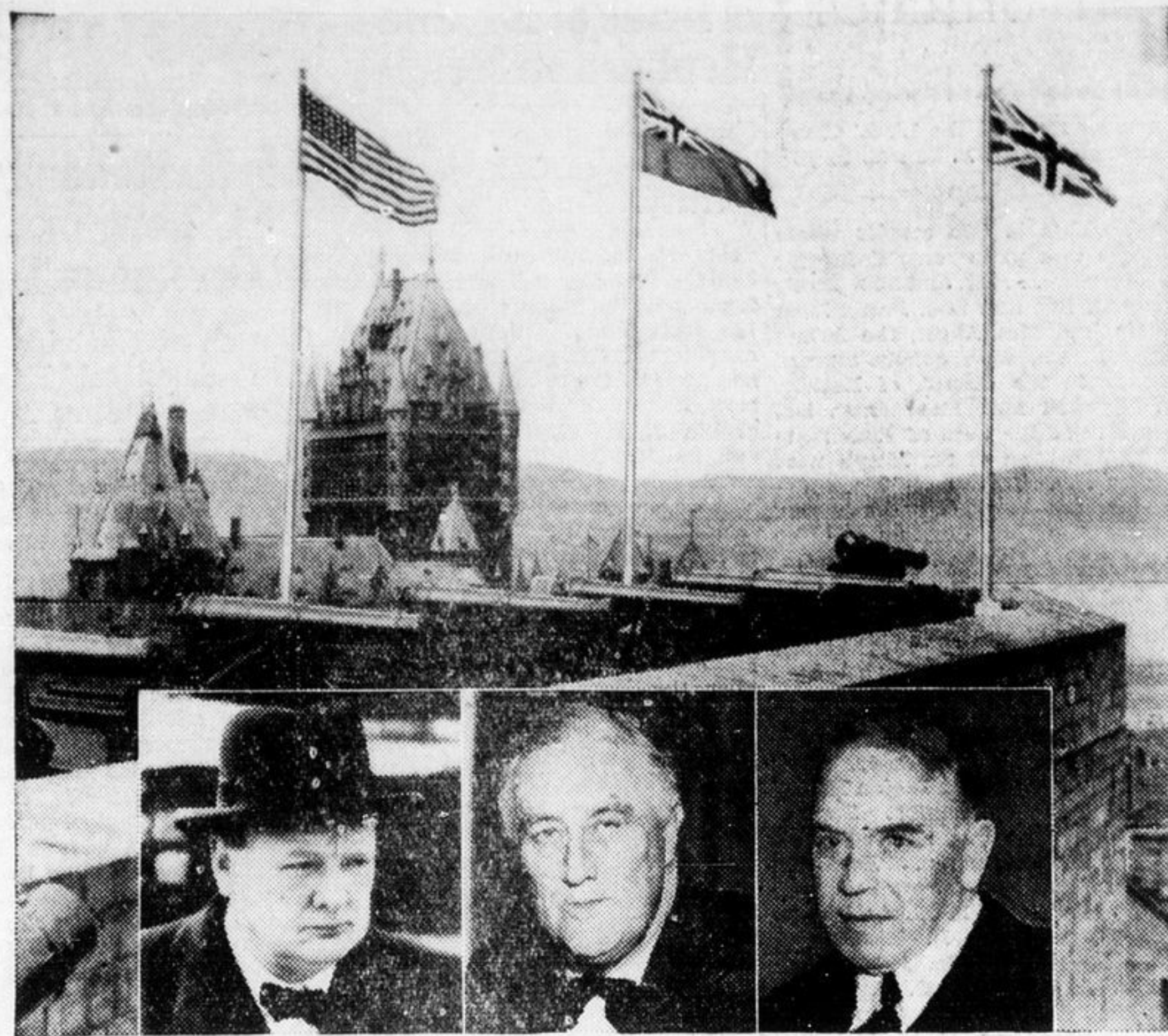

Two disorderly conduct charges resulted in fines of \$5 and costs each.

Hector Nadon, charged with high-grading and illegally operating a refinery was sentenced to 18 months in the first charge while the latter was withdrawn. Greg. Evans put up a strong plea for leniency, pointing out that the man or men inducing others to illegal traffic in gold were the real culprits. He described Nadon as a hard-working young man never in any sort of trouble before and only a very minor figure in high-grading activities. Chateau Frontenac "Work Centre" of Conference



Framed in this picture by the flags of Great Britain, the United States and Canada, the Chateau Frontenac, world-famed Quebec City, fulfilled its most important role as the "work centre" of the strategy conference of the democracies for which Canada was host. The towering Chateau, seen here from the cannon-guarded battlements of the historic Citadelle, housed the technical experts who came to the conference on the staffs of Prime Minister Winston Churchill, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt and Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King (left to right in insets) who themselves stayed in the Citadelle. Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and Secretary of State Cordell Hull, the British and American experts on foreign policy, lived at the Chateau Frontenac.

Vaccinated against smallpox—3

Number of infants having received 3 doses this year:—Whooping Cough—22; Toxoid—147; Number Vaccinated this year—110.

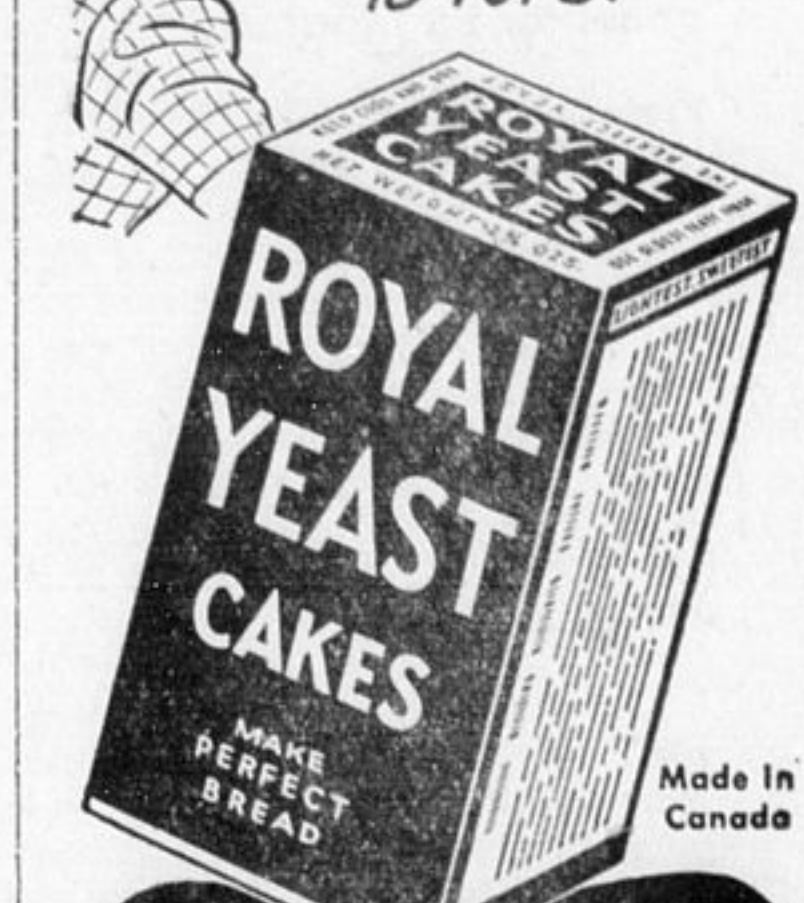
Kiwanis Club Meeting on Tuesday Next Week

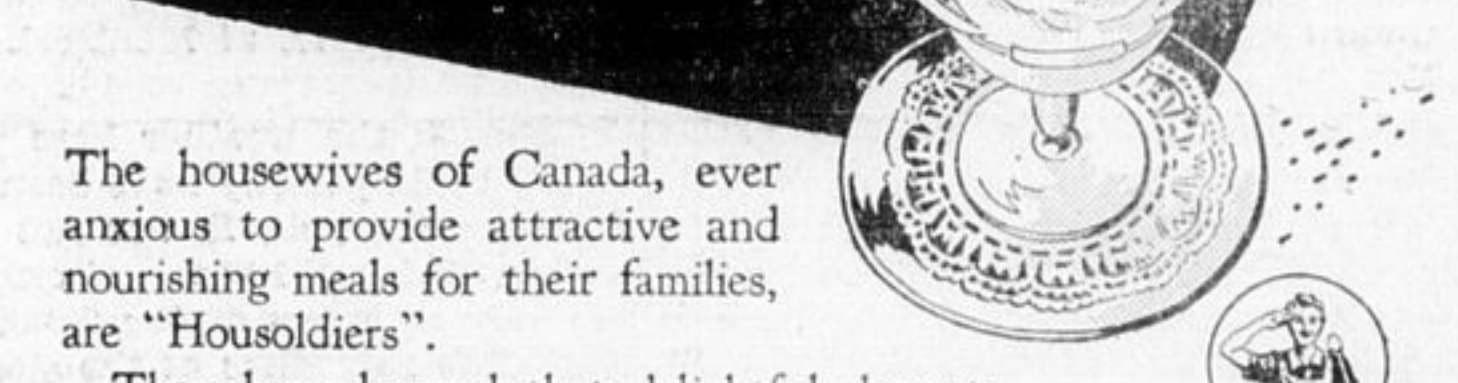
