Council to Introduce By-law to Change Times of Nominations, Election

Likely Change Also in Date of First Meeting of Council in New Year. By-Law in Accordance with Recent Amendment to Municipal Act. Council Passes By-law Regulating Planting of Trees.

The regular meeting of the town council on Monday was a very short one and also came close to making a record for the lack of attendance of any ratepayers outside the council, the town engineer and the fire chief. There was only one newspaperman present - just in time to hear the motion to adjourn.

Probably the chief items of busines: before the council for the day were matters relating to by-laws. One of these was a notice of motion to introduce a by-law at the next meeting of the council to set the times for municlpal nominations and elections. Recent amendments to the Municipal Act make such a by-law necessary. It is proposed that the date for the nomination meeting hereafter shall be the first Friday in December, and that Dec. 14th of each year be the election date, irrespective of the day of the week, except that in case the 14th falls on a Saturday or Sunday the election shall be held on the following Monday. It is also proposed to have this by-law set the time for all nominations as 7.30 in the evening. To this will be added the plan of having the first meeting of the new council for each year held on the first Monday in January. In recent years the inaugural meeting has been | 6 p.m. on the second Monday in January.

The other business about a by-law was the passing of By-law 832, regulating the planting of trees in the municipality. Under this by-law trees henceforth in the town must be planted only under the approval of the town engineer. The engineer is also to supervise the trimming of trees and to remove decayed or dangrous trees. No person shall injure or destroy trees except on order of the engineer. Trees planted on highways without authority may be removed without notice. The maximum penalty for infraction of this by-law is \$50.00 and costs.
