

# Eight More Gold Mills in Ontario Have Stopped Production This Year

Three of These Were in the Porcupine Area. Both Tonnage and Value of Production Down in Ontario This Year. Dept. of Mines Gives Detailed Figures.

The following is the Ontario Department of Mines' gold bulletin issued for October, 1943:

Production of Ontario's gold mines during the first nine months of 1943 was well below the same period of the preceding year. The gold industry for the period under review, milled 6,203,926 tons of ore recovered 1,592,081 ounces gold, 243,188 ounces silver, valued at \$61,386,620. During the same period of 1942 the figures were, 8,140,227 tons milled, 2,060,004 ounces gold, 331,356 ounces silver, valued at \$79,438,092. This represents a drop of 23.8% in ore milled 22.7% in gold recovered, 26.6% in silver recovered, and 22.7% in value.

That the gold industry shows no inclination to stop its recession, is well indicated by statistics covering the month of September. These show a new low production value since September, 1935. During the month the gold mills treated 604,682 tons of ore as against 799,784 in September, 1942. Both gold recovery and value of bullion were down 24%. There were 57 mines operating in September 1942 and only 42 in September 1943. The daily average production record for the month in question gives a tonnage of 20,156 tons milled, 5,201 ounces gold, 945 ounces silver, and a value of \$205,510.

Since the beginning of the year eight mills ceased to operate. These were: Naybob, Moneta and Hoyle (the latter on account of fire) in Porcupine; Yama, in Larder Lake; Regnery, in Algoma; Jerome, in Matachewan; Uchi, in Patricia and Wendigo, in Kenora.

It is interesting to note that the 42 mills still in operation are only producing at 63% of capacity. This may be explained in part by the fact that average monthly employment figures at the gold mines dropped from 17,250 for the first eight months of 1942, to 12,561 for the comparable period of 1943. Employment figures show a gradual lowering tendency.

### McIntyre Porcupine Mine Earnings for Quarter

While gross income of McIntyre Porcupine Mines Limited for the three months ended September 30th, 1943, the second quarter of the company's current fiscal year, was approximately \$25,000 lower than in the preceding three months, costs were reduced by approximately the same amount, an interim statement discloses. Net profits, after depreciation and taxes, were

equivalent to 92c per share, as against 91c per share in the June period.

Total income for the six months ended September 30th amounted to 4,110,130, as against \$4,690,549 in the corresponding period of 1942, the report shows. Total costs including development were \$2,648,234 as compared with \$3,173,566, and net profits \$1,461,897 or \$1.83 per share as against \$1,516,983 or \$1.90 per share.

## Economical Cheese Dish Needs Only Bread and Milk

Recipe for "English Monkey." Also Menu for Day

Many cook books contain a recipe for something called English monkey—which is basically cheese, milk, bread and an egg if you happen to have it. No one seems to know how it got its name, but many people will testify to its efficiency in feeding several unexpected guests who drop in just after the grocery stores are closed for the day.

Here is a simple recipe which will feed four:  
6 slices bread  
1/2 lb. American cheese  
3 or 4 tablespoons fat  
2 to 3 cups milk  
1 egg, well beaten (optional)  
Salt and pepper  
Butter a baking dish. Place slices of bread therein. Add milk, to which beaten egg, salt and pepper has been added. If cheese is to be sliced, incorporate it between the slices of bread; if grated, stir into the mixture, after the milk has been absorbed by the bread and the whole dish is a sort of soft mush. Bake in a moderate oven for 25 minutes. Mustard, curry powder minced onion — in fact almost any seasoning you can think of can be added to this basic recipe successfully.

**Lamb Cutlets**  
2 lbs. lamb's neck  
2 tablespoons salad oil  
1 tablespoon vinegar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Pinch black pepper  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1 onion, minced  
1 egg  
1 tablespoon milk  
Bread crumbs

Trim fat off meat and cut into slices about 1/2 inch thick. Flatten with a rolling pin or the blade of a heavy knife. Mix vinegar, oil, salt pepper and paprika, add minced onion and soak the meat therein for 3 or 4 hours. Keep basting occasionally. When ready to cook, dip into egg beaten with milk, then into crumbs and fry in hot fat until golden brown. Serve with the dressing in which the meat soaked. You may add sour cream or chopped fresh cucumber, if desired.

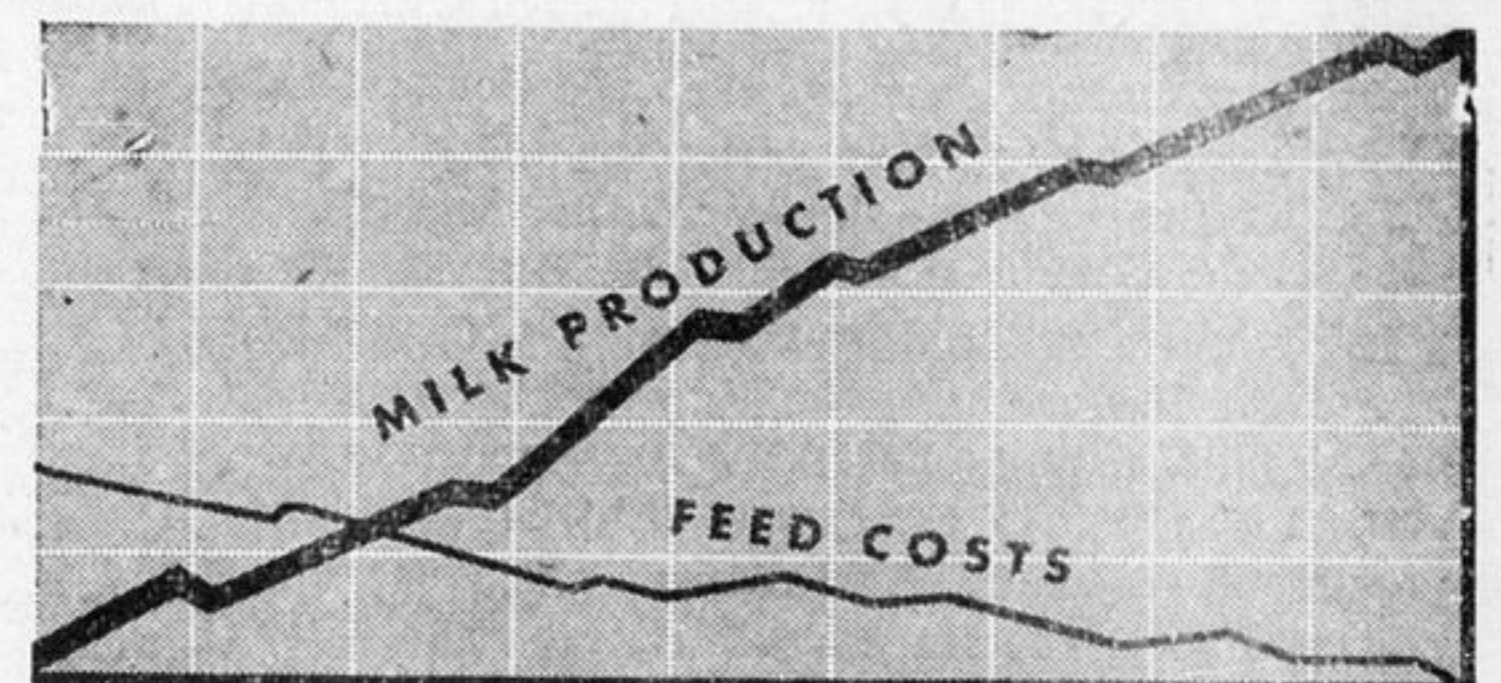
At the completion of the agenda, a delicious tea was served by the hostess, with Mrs. Barry presiding at the tea table.
