Clean-up of Old Charges on Police Court List Here

Over 10 Cases Hanging Fire Finally Disposed of.

This week a clean-up was made of cases on the police court docket that had been hanging fire for some time, some going back several years, because of absence of witnesses or other cause. All were finally disposed of, most of them being withdrawn. There were over 100 such cases.
 At police court on Tuesday the docket was a comparatively light one, with a few remands.
 For driving without the necessary permit one man paid \$5.00 and costs. Two second offence drunks were assessed \$50 and costs each or thirty days and will spend Christmas in jail as a consequence. A young lady was fined \$10 and costs, or ten days, for being drunk, and \$100.00 and costs or three months for having liquor permits that did not belong to her. When arrested for drunkenness she had her own liquor permits in her purse and also three others made out in the name of a man whose address was given differently for each of the beer, wine and liquor permits. Her explanation in court was that the man had left the permits with her to give to her mother to keep for him while he was working in the bush. The magistrate pointed out that the law did not allow anyone to carry around permits in the names of other people. Failing to pay the fines the young lady will spend 3 months and ten days in jail.
 Nilo Hammula pleaded not guilty to careless driving in the collision with another car at a street intersection. He was represented by Mr. J. E. Lamminen who put up a good defence, suggesting that the stop sign might have been obscured by the snow storm and that the position of the cars indicated that his client had the right of way. Magistrate Atkinson pointed out that the police and other witnesses were sure that the stop sign was not obscured. A fine of \$10 and costs was imposed.
 A wage case was dismissed, the plaintiff not appearing.
 A fine of \$50 and costs was imposed on C. A. Remus for illegally having loose gasoline coupons. On a visit to the store Sergt. Braney, of the Gold Squad, found the coupons and turned them over to the W. F. T. B. On behalf of the accused, Greg Evans explained that while a plea of guilty was entered, there had been no intention to do anything wrong. Mr. Remus had a farm out in the country which he had to visit every day, and as he had sent his own gasoline coupon book to Toronto to have it renewed he had secured the coupons from Mr. Carl Steinburner, a neighbouring farmer. S. C. Platus for the War-time Prices and Trade Board said that the matter was a serious one as it involved others if successful. Although the coupons had not been used, the matter could not be treated lightly. Magistrate Atkinson made the penalty

Left to mourn her loss are her husband Herbert Bourne, of the Hollinger Mine, and two daughters, one of Sudbury and one of Toronto.
 Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon at 2:07 with Rev. Mustard and Rev. Brackstone conducting the service. The remains were shipped to Toronto for interment. Funeral arrangements were under S. T. Walker Funeral Parlours.

About the New General Manager of the Hollinger

Has Firm Belief in the Future of Gold.

A recent issue of The Financial Post, Toronto, contained the following reference to Mr. E. L. Longmore, the new manager of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines:—
Holly's New G. M.
 Thirty-one years ago, when E. L. "Happy" Longmore joined the staff of the infant Hollinger Gold Mines at Timmins as a young engineer, he became acquainted with his new setting by touring the mine and visiting every working place. The tour started at 3.30 in the afternoon and was finished long before supper was served at the small mine staff house.
 When Longmore assumes the management of the leading Canadian gold mine on January 1, 1944, succeeding John Knox, Sr., he isn't likely to undertake the same complete inspection. Since he first came to the property, Hollinger has grown to such proportions that an inspection of all the working places today is a job which would take several years.
 That's an illustration of the growth of the big mine which Hollinger's new manager has witnessed and helped to bring about in the years he was moving upward from his first post in the mine's assay office through various other positions to the management.
 It's a far cry from digging the loam of a farm in Lennox-Addington county in old Ontario to digging precious gold in the flinty depths of a northern gold mine. But that's the story of Hollinger's new manager. After farming for eight years, he decided to enter Queen's University for an engineering course.
 In vacation periods he did what many university students did in those days, travelled west to teach during the summer at places where regular school-teachers were not available. One summer he managed to get a place in the now defunct Bankhead coal mines — quite an achievement in the days when the hard, practical men running Canada's mines could find little use for "book-educated" miners.
 When real mining beckoned after graduation, he was off to the Porcupine where the railroad had just been pushed through to Timmins and the Hollinger mine. Hollinger had an engineer shortage at the time and he became the sixth on the small staff.
 Longmore has worked at the same property for 21 years, he has seen it develop into the country's biggest gold mine. He has participated in the development of many features of gold mining which are definitely peculiar to Hollinger, such as the low-cost crushing, grinding and milling of gold ore which enables the company to mill rock containing as low as 0.1 ounces of gold in every ton. This means picking out by the cyanide process the one small speck of yellow gold from among 300,000 parts of waste rock dust. His work in the development of this process to such a high degree of efficiency won for him the Randolph Bruce Gold Medal, presented to him by the Cana-

dian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy in 1937.
 As Hollinger's chief metallurgist, the position he has held in recent years, he was responsible for the highly regarded milling methods installed at Young-Davidson and the Ross mines, two properties operated by Hollinger. Besides these duties he has taken time to serve as a member of the Timmins town council for 10 terms, two of them as mayor. He was a member of the Committee of Enquiry named by the Ontario Government to investigate education costs in Ontario in 1936-37. For two years until two months ago, he was general manager of Wartime Metals Corporation, a government agency set up to provide for Canada strategic metals not then available for war needs. Wartime Metals supervised the bringing into operation of such important sources of needed metals as Dominion Magnesium at Bailey's Ont., LaCerne Molybdenite and Emerald Tungsten, in British Columbia.
 Coming into the management of the country's biggest gold mine on Jan. 1, 1944, when Mr. Knox retires to serve as the company's consulting engineer, Mr. Longmore quite naturally has some pretty solid ideas about the future of the metal which Hollinger produces in such quantity.
 He's not worried about gold's future or any of the highly theoretical plans about junking gold as a medium of exchange.
