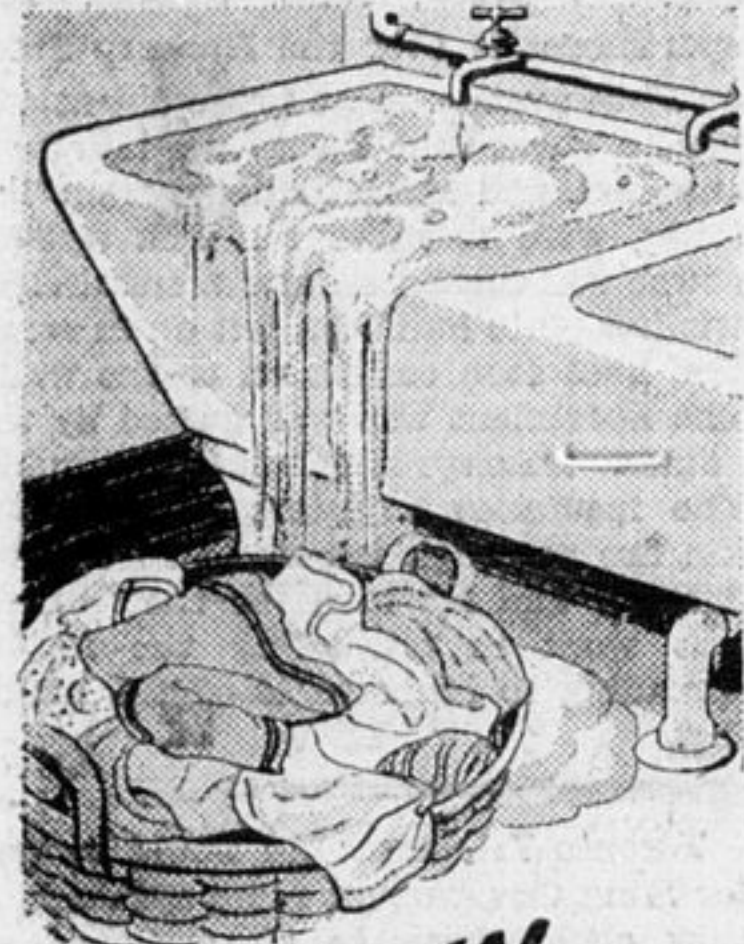

Roll as for jelly-roll. Cut in 1-inch slices. Mix molasses and water and pour into well-greased layer cake pan. Sprinkle with remaining nuts. Place biscuits on remaining nuts. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) about 35 minutes. Turn out immediately. Makes 10.
